# WRYE CALLS FOR DOMESTICS' RIGHTS

INTERCEDE has learned that recently Ontario Minister of Labour William Wrye put forward a proposal to expand the rights of domestic workers under the Employment Standards Act. The proposal reflects a number of INTERCEDE's key recommendations and it includes:

- coverage of domestic workers under the hours of work and overtime provisions
- \* a written agreement, signed by the employer and the domestic, which sets out the hours of work, plus a record of overtime hours
- \* revoking the daily, weekly and monthly minimum pay rates and applying the <u>hourly</u> minimum, plus time and one-half for each hour worked in excess of 44 hours weekly
- \* a new rate of \$10.00 per week for board if the room is <u>shared</u>, or the regular \$20.00 per week if the room is private
- \* a new regulation which does not permit employers to deduct for meals which have not been eaten and rooms that have not been occupied
- \* coverage of domestics working 24 hours or less per week for an employer under the minimum wage
- \* requiring that a live-in domestic who works during her weekly free period be paid one and one-half times the regular rate of pay

\* amending the Labour Relations Act to cover all domestic workers employed in private households

Mr. Wrye's proposal has been discussed and approved by cabinet committees on race relations, social policy and economic impact. Other ministers in the Liberal government have also promoted these changes and played an advocacy role on behalf of domestic workers' rights, especially Attorney <u>General Ian Scott</u>, who is also the Minister Responsible for Women's Issues, and Lily Munro, Minister of Citizenship and Culture.

In spite of this support, Mr Wrye's proposal was not approved when it came before the full Cabinet at a recent meeting. The whole question of domestic worker's rights was deferred for 'further study'!

INTERCEDE is alarmed at this untimely decision. The government has been studying the issue since it came to power in 1985, and all we have after 1½ years is just another delay!

We have requested an urgent meeting with Mr. Wrye which is scheduled to take place on February 3. We have also requested a meeting with <u>Premier David</u> <u>Peterson</u> in order to appeal to him personally to end the exploitation of domestic workers in this province.

INTERCEDE feels strongly that the time for action is long overdue. We are asking the government for assurances that it will take action in the very near future, otherwise we will have no choice but to proceed with a court challenge to the Ontario labour laws under the Charter of Rights.

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Unfortunately 1987 brings a cut in all our paycheques because deductions are increasing - again!

As of January 1, if you are a foreign domestic worker receiving the minimum rate of pay, this is your breakdown:

Monthly: \$827.50 Gross Pay 238.00 Room & Board 11.71 Canada Pension 19.45 Unemployment Ins. 82.55 Income Tax

That leaves: 475.74 Net Pay

If you are a permanent resident, the legal minimum pay rate minus deductions is as follows:

Monthly: \$823.00 Gross Pay 238.00 Room & Board 11.68 Canada Pension 19.34 Unemployment Ins. 79.95 Income Tax

That leaves: 474.03 Net Pay

The minimum yearly pay (gross) for a foreign domestic worker is \$9,930.00.

The minimum yearly pay (gross) under Ontario labour law is \$\$9,876.00.

Remember, that if you are experienced and/or have special skills you can negotiate a higher rate of pay with your employer.

## WEINER TO MEET WITH INTERCEDE

Minister of State for Immigration, Gerry Weiner, will be meeting with an INTERCEDE delegation on January 31. The meeting will be held at the Cecil Community Centre and include members of the INTERCEDE board and staff, as well as community representatives.

High on the agenda is the issue of the immigration processing fees. INTERCEDE has called on the Minister to exempt foreign domestic workers from having to pay the \$50.00 charge for new work permits and the \$125.00 charge for landing applications.

We have estimated that the new fees have already cost foreign domestics \$1,125,000 for work permits only in the last year!

Our <u>letter-writing campaign</u> to Mr. Weiner protesting the processing fees is having a clear impact. His Ottawa office told us recently that the letters are arriving on his desk 'thick and heavy'.

On January 31 we will have the opportunity to appeal to Mr. Weiner personally to provide relief to foreign domestic workers from the heavy financial burden imposed by the fees.

We ask all our friends and supporters in the community to <u>help us in</u> <u>this critical effort</u>. If you have not already sent a copy of our open letter to the Minister, please do so NOW before the end of the month!

Many of you have already sent in a letter, and we <u>thank you</u> for doing your part. Give the attached letter to a friend or workmate. The more voices are raised in protest the greater our chances of convincing Mr. Weiner to act!
