QUEBEC DOMESTICS SCORE VICTORY!

In recent months the <u>Household Workers Association of Montreal has</u> been spearheading a public campaign to win more protection for domestic workers under Quebec's labour laws.

The Association has appealed to the government to meet the following demands for basic rights:

- * include all domestics under the Labour Standards Act; those who care for children are currently excluded
- * grant live-in domestics wage parity with live-out workers; the minimum wage for live-ins is only \$3.03hr as compared to \$4.55hr for live-outs
- * grant live-in domestics overtime pay after the standard 44 hours a week instead of the current 53 hours

The Household Workers Association is made up of domestic workers from many cultural and racial backgrounds. They work closely with their allies in the community. A petition is being circulated in support of the above demands and 6000 signatures have been collected already!

On January 15, 1988, Association representatives met with Quebec Minister of Labour, <u>Pierre Paradis</u>, and two senior policy advisors. They renewed their call for action made in an earlier meeting with the Minister last fall. They also presented a case history of a foreign domestic being paid only \$30-40 a week who was recently beaten by her employer.

Maria Ciampi, of the Association, told INTERCEDE that the meeting with the Minister was very successful. He revealed that he was making the following proposals for change:

- * include domestics who do a combination of housework and childcare in the Labour Standards Act
- * grant live-in domestics the same minimum wage (\$4.55hr) as live-outs

The new amendments are expected to come into effect in the fall and they represent a significant victory for Quebec domestic workers.

The Association remains concerned that domestics who care mostly for children, the elderly or the handicapped will still be excluded from the Labour Standards Act. "We maintain that anyone whose main source of income comes from doing household work should be guaranteed certain rights, just like any other worker", said Ms. Ciampi. "Our battle is not over", she added.

INTERCEDE salutes the <u>Household Workers</u> <u>Association of Montreal for this im-</u> portant breakthrough. We assure you of our steadfast support as you continue to fight for our sisters in Quebec!

ARE YOU GETTING OVERTIME PAY?

At INTERCEDE's last monthly meeting, an informal survey was held to see how many live-in domestics are receiving overtime pay. Conducted by <u>Mary Eberts</u>, of the <u>Women's Legal Education & Ac-</u> tion Fund (LEAF), the poll revealed that, of the 120 domestics present, a full <u>one half</u> were working more than 44 hours a week and not receiving any overtime pay. Only four were receiving time off in lieu of overtime pay.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

As of January 1, 1988, the deductions on your pay have changed slightly. The rates below apply to foreign domestics who are working 44 hours a week with no overtime. If you work more than 44 hours a week, these rates are too low: you should be receiving time and a half (\$6.83hr) for each hour you work in excess of 44 a week. Your totals for the week, month, etc. would, therefore, be higher.

Please use the rates below as a <u>sample</u> <u>guide</u> only. If you are a full-time live-in worker this is the <u>very least</u> you should be paid:

MONTHLY	247.00 90.10	Gross Pay* Room & Board Income Tax Canada Pension Unempl. Insur.
That leaves:	497.02	Net Pay
BI-WEEKLY	114.00 42.10	Gross Pay* Room & Board Income Tax Canada Pension Unempl. Insur.
That leaves:	228.88	Net Pay
WEEKLY	57.00	Income Tax Canada Pension
That leaves:	114.45	Net Pay

* Remember Gross Pay is based on 44 hours a week with no overtime.

It's that time of year again and all foreign domestic workers are required to file an income tax return. Your employer is required by law to give you a T-4 slip by February 28, 1988. You are responsible for filing your own return. No one can do it for you.
