ORDER TO DEPORT EDMONTON NANNY REVERSED BY FEDERAL COURT

A Federal Court order overturned a decision of the Immigration Ministry to deport Celia Felipe, a Filipino nanny in Edmonton who was diagnosed with cancer three years ago.

INTERCEDE published Celia's story in its newsletter of December 1993 and had appealed to Immigration to reverse the deportation order against her. INTERCEDE learned about the nanny's plight from supporters and friends who are credited with carrying out a year long campaign to oppose the Immigration ministry's decision which was upheld by former Public Security Minister Doug Lewis.

Because she was diagnosed with cancer, Celia was declared medically inadmissible even if her own doctor and immigration physicians confirmed that the cancer was in remission.

Sharish Chotalia, Celia's lawyer, was pleased with the favourable decision of the Federal Court but said that medical inadmissibility remained unchallenged. That means that workers in the Live-in Caregiver program who are subjected to another medical exam after applying for permanent residence may not be granted landed status if she or any of her dependents are found to be medically inadmissible.

According to the lawyer, denying LCP workers and their dependents entry into Canada because of physical disability constitutes a violation of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Chotalia said that domestic workers in the LCP

should know that decisions made by lmmigration officials such as deportation orders, or decisions taken by any other government officials, can be subject to judicial review, which is the recourse taken in Celia Felipe's case.

CALL INTERCEDE IF YOU DON'T MEET DEADLINE

The Ontario Ministry of Health has confirmed in a press release that OHIP coverage will continue for workers, nannies and caregivers under the Live-in Caregiver Program (LCP), including those already on open work permits.

At the same time, the Ministry also confirmed the requirement that domestic and caregiver workers "must take their work authorizations to a Ministry of Health office to renew their OHIP coverage beyond June 30, 1994". In addition to this work authorization, they must bring their passport and another document that shows their name and current address.

Anyone under the LCP who has missed the June 30 deadline must call INTERCEDE for assistance. The Health ministry has also confirmed that even if the LCP worker is covered under OHIP, family members who came to Ontario with her will not be covered and will need private health insurance.

SIGNIFICANCE OF JULY 14, 1994 TO FOREIGN DOMESTIC WORKERS

July 14, 1994 has been declared "Freedom from the Debt Day" by groups around the world that are pressuring to cancel Third World Debts made through the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank (IMF-WB).

The IMF-WB are international lending institutions that keep countries of the Third World (countries like the Philippines, in Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean) in a "debt trap". These countries are forced to follow the dictates of the IMF-WB about how their economies should be run so that they can pay their ever-increasing debt loads.

As a result, debt-ridden countries have suffered massive poverty, destruction of their environment, political instability, dictatorship and militarism - and forced migration of their people from rural to urban areas to foreign countries in search of work.

Most foreign domestic workers in Canada have migrated from such countries. The Philippines, for example, depends on the dollar remittances of its migrant labourers all over the world in order to pay interest and services on its estimated \$38 Billion dollar debt. So it is no exaggeration to say that domestic workers who form the majority of contract workers leaving the country, are paying the Philippines' foreign debt.

FIRST AID FOR EMERGENCIES

(by St. John Ambulance, 2nd of a series)

To handle an emergency situation properly, use Priority Action Approach. What is Priority Action Approach?

- 1. Take charge.
- 2. Call out for help.
- 3. Assess the hazards.
- 4. Make the area safe. Protect yourself and others by wearing latex or vinyl gloves when giving first aid. Use a shield or face mask with a one-way valve.
- 5. Identify yourself and offer to help.
- 6. Assess the casualty for responsiveness. If unresponsive, send or go for medical help.
- 7. Assess the casualty and give first aid for stopped breathing. Assess the casualty and give first aid for severe bleeding. Give first aid for unconsciousness.
- 8. Send or go for help ambulance, police etc.

If head and/or spinal injury is suspected, do not move the casualty. Send for medical help.

Artificial respiration AR (adult)

- 1. Perform step 1 to 6 of Priority Action Approach above.
- 2. Open the airway by lifting the chin and pressing back on the forehead.
- 3. Check for breathing for 3 to 5 seconds:
 - look for chest movement
 - listen for breathing
 - feel for breath on your cheek.
- 4. If the casualty is not breathing keep the airway open and pinch the nostrils. Make a tight seal over the mouth and blow 2 slow breaths. If the chest does not rise, reposition the head and try again.
 - If the chest still does not rise, give abdominal thrusts (see * below)
- 5. If the chest rises check pulse at the side of the neck for 5 to 10 seconds. If no pulse is detected, and you are trained, apply CPR.
- 6. If a pulse is felt, continue AR, giving one breath every 5 seconds. Recheck pulse and spontaneous breathing after one minute of AR and every few minutes after that. Continue AR until the casualty starts breathing or medical help takes over.
- * Abdominal thrusts
 - Kneel astride the casualty's legs. Find the top of the hip bones with your hands.
 - Place the heel of one hand midline on the abdomen, and slightly above the other hand. Place the other hand on top, fingers raised.
 - Thrust inward and upward up to 5 times.
 Make each thrust forceful and distinct.

Loss of consciousness may threaten life if the person is on her/his back and the tongue has dropped to the back of the throat, blocking the airway.

Make certain that the person is breathing, then turn her/him into the <u>recovery position</u> (lying on the left side, with left leg straight and right knee bent comfortably, and right elbow bent so that face rests on the back of right hand).

Never give anything by mouth to an unconscious casualty. Get medical help and check breathing frequently.
