JSW Success Story Jackielyn Policarpio

From the day that I set foot in Canada, I immediately had the feeling that everything was going to be alright with me. My two older sisters resided here. I had no doubts that they would take care of me; their so called "little sister". Looking after me was a bit challenging for my sisters.

I migrated to Canada as a Live-in Caregiver- I lived with my employers. Although it was hard for me at first, I managed well. I am pleased that I was able to adjust myself to a new country, new culture and new living situation.

My sisters used to work as Caregivers under the Live-in Caregiver Program. They were both very supportive. Trusting their wisdom, I listened to their advice.

I was introduced to INTERCEDE. I then became an active member of the organization. On weekends I attended training workshops that helped me with personal and professional development. I also upgraded my skills based on the information I received about the Labour Market, from the JSW (Job Search Workshop)

Through assistance from the staff at INTERCEDE I was able to make consistent progress towards my future goal. The service was free. When I successfully finished my 24 months under LCP, I immediately applied for an Open Permit and Landed Immigrant Status. One month and two weeks after I received my permit, I was hired as a full time Medical Office Assistant at a Clinic in Toronto.

YOU ASK US AND WE ANSWER by INTERCEDE Counselors

Question:

I am a Live-in Caregiver. On March 2007 I applied for permanent residence and open work permit. I included my family members in my application. My employment was terminated on June 2007. I had concerns about how being unemployed would affect my permanent residence application.

So, I called the CIC Call Centre and informed them that I **sponsored** my family members in the Philippines and I was now unemployed. The CIC agent told me that I should be employed full time while my sponsorship was being processed; otherwise my family's application for permanent residence might be refused. Is that true? I am now confused. Please help me.

Answer:

No, that's not true. In your case, it does not matter if you are unemployed. It will not affect your application as long as you have worked for twenty four months as a live-in caregiver within three years of your arrival in Canada. You and your family members will receive permanent residence status if you have:

- Real Passed the security clearance (Police check)
- Real Passed a medical examination
- Certification of "no previous marriage" record for spouses (for applicants from the Philippines)
- Proof that all children over 22 years old are still full time dependents

You are not yet a landed immigrant or citizen. Sponsorship" of family members and other relatives is done by immigrants and citizens of any country that allows this process. Regarding your application under the LCP, the term "sponsorship" does not apply.

Question:

My employers are not giving me a pay slip and I have no idea how much was deducted from my salary. They are paying me cash and my friends told me I will be in trouble because I should be paid by cheque as proof of my employment. How will I know if my employers have remitted the Taxes, CPP and EI deductions they have taken from my salary? What should I do?

Answer:

You can call Revenue Canada and enquire if your employers made any remittances on your behalf. If no remittances were made, then request that your employers remit your taxes. If they refuse, you can file a claim against them at Revenue Canada. It does not matter if you were paid in cash or in cheque. You should be given a pay slip every time you receive your salary. Keep a record of all your working hours and copies of your pay slips as proof of your salary deductions.

COCO'S CORNER:

Mercy shed tears of happiness. The result of her Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) conference was positive. She released a big, deep breath after answering the series of questions. She had appealed the initial result of her sponsorship application. She was refused due to insufficient annual income.

The decision was based on the following:

- Mercy was alone in Canada. She had obtained Canadian citizenship after grueling years, working as a domestic worker. She had upgraded her skill in health care and had been taking care of seniors who has medical problems.
- ☞ For over 16 years in Canada, Mercy was never a recipient of Employment Insurance or any social assistance. She worked to support herself and her children back in her country.
- Mercy was very self-sufficient and fully adjusted to 63 Canadian way of life but then realized that being alone in Canada was lonely and scary. She was surrounded by friends but it was different. It would be more beneficial if her family members were around.
- One of Mercy's children (son) was a single parent 63 of two children. She gave him financial support. She then chose to sponsor him to join her in Canada.
- Mercy's son had a special skill. That would make it easy for him to find employment once he arrived in Canada.
- In spite of Mercy's meager income she maintained 63 paying monthly premiums on her life insurance and had impressive Investments and RRSP (Registered Retirement Savings Plan). She was also part owner of a real state property.
- Mercy had integrated well into the Canadian society.

Mercy relied on the guidance and services of IN-TERCEDE who assisted and coached her during her appeal interview. She is now waiting the arrival of her son. Their re-unification will take place soon.
