There were some hassles like noise from the street and hauling water from the second floor. She also spoke of the pleasures, not having to travel for meetings, private concerts when the band practised, and of course the womyn. I perked up at that statement.

"What about the womyn?" I

asked.

She smiled "They're wonderful, friendly and kind, although sometimes they forget to clean up or lock the door."

"Oh, do you know very many?" I asked.

"Hundreds," she assured me, "do you prefer legs or breasts?"

Once again I was shocked at her directness. How did she know? or was I misinterpreting again? I decided to take a chance, swallowing and looking her straight in the eye I replied, "I prefer breasts."

"Oh goody," she said "I got some really delicious ones."

My shock once again turned to embarrassment as she pulled a plate of fried chicken from the fridge.

We had a swell dinner and watched the sunset over the gardens (Maple Leaf that is) from her 4 by 4 foot fire escape balcony.

News: NO HOPE FOR PORT HOPE

The recent Port Hope flood has left radioactive waste in its wake. Eldorado Nuclear, the company responsible for dumping the 150,000 tons of uranium refinement waste near the town, has said the waste is low level and the residents should have no "cause for concern".

Port Hope is situated on Lake Ontario, the source of Torontonians drinking water supply. When questioned "authorities" said that "the radioactivity will sink to the bottom of the lake" therefore, we are to infer, rendering it harmless.

This, of course, is questionable. The reported low level radioactivity is anything but, since this kind is present in colour TVs and florescent lights. But people will believe anything and I would too if I lived in Port Hope. I also find fascinating the kind of logic these authorities use, because as it is very, very true that this radioactivity will sink to the bottom of the lake it is equally true it will float on top, and be suspended in the middle, and be absorbed by fishes, and......J.P.

Excitedly I dialed the number and asked for some bar referrals; to my embarrassment I discovered they referred attorneys, not taverns.

I then called Woman Books and had much better luck at getting some real bar referrals.

My friends and I were in the Big A a week and we tried to go to as many places and spaces as possible. Galleries by day, shows and bars by night. We trudged up and down the avenues and only skimmed the surface of the big big city. The following is a list and short description of some of the places we visited:


