The upshot of this is that we have decided to introduce a subscription policy. #### Task Force looking for new focus

The Loot Task Force has asked for this space in the newsletter to send a special message to Loot members. First of all, we hope you have had a terrific summer and that you plan to spend some of your time this fall with LOOT. There has been much new energy at 342 Jarvis and many new members over the past couple of months. The task Force's activities are somewhat low profile, which may mean that the Task Force is a mystery to you. We want to tell you who we are and what we do.

The Task Force was originally set up 2 years ago to find space for a women's centre. When we found 342 Jarvis St. our activities expanded to administering the house and coordinating LOOT activities. Both of these often boil down to financial responsibilities. Task Force members make sure that the rent is paid and the untility bills covered. We deal with the landlord and see that the house is being maintained.

We also try to coordinate LOOT'S activities. Most Task Force members were on the original task force. This provides an historical perspective that helps new committees avoid old mistakes. Some members have ties with other gay and/or feminist organizations and they keep LOOT in touch with the political currents in the gay and women's communities. Together we try to come up with new ideas for the organization.

Because much of our work goes on behind the scene, many LOOT members think the committee is closed. This is simply not true, our meetings are open to all lesbians. We meet every second Wednesday night at 342 Jarvis St. We are looking for new faces and fresh input. See you at the next meeting.

#### Women's concert

Toronto's music-starved lesbian community enjoyed its first women's concert in many months on August 25, when the American women's group Izquierda (Spanish for "left") and the Torontonians April Kassirer and Arlene Mantle performed at Innis College.

Originally intended as a women's only event, the organizers opened up the ticket sales to men as well, in order to break even on the expenses of the concert. The pub afterwards was maintained as an exclusively lesbian event. Many gay male activists were in attendance, curious to see for themselves the women's music they had only heard about. Gaydays in general had the healthy effect of exposing gay men to the vitality of lesbian-feminist culture. The audience was appreciative of Izquierda and Izquierda felt afterwards very warm towards the audience.

The concert began with an easy-going enjoyable set by our own Arlene Mantle, followed by April Kassirer, whose fine guitar work continues to delight and amaze the multitudes. The women from Olivia will doubtlessly snap her up soon and snatch her from among us. Izquierda, a group of four women whose forte is vocal harmonies, gave a strong performance. Their repertoire consists mostly of original up-front feminist material, together with some Latin American songs.

The women of Sappho Sound should also be thanked for the music at the concert and at the fair the next day; they are learning their trade but not at our expense. The evening concluded with hordes of happy lesbians dancing in the aisles at the Innis Pub, the liveliest bunch which this popular cafeteria for academics has probably seen in years.

there is no real way of "dealing with" your situation, only of surviving it. there are however, two alternative ways of handling it. the first, and easiest method if by screaming, crying, and threatening suicide if she leaves. i would not use this method unless you want her to leave permanently. the other way is to sit down and talk with her. find out what her expectations of you are, and what she wants from your present relationship. let her know how you feel and what your worries and expectations are. try discussing sanely and reasonably how she sees this "other woman" fitting in. try not to make any rash statements like "it's either her or me".if all rational seduction and discussion fails, grit your teeth and help her pack.



#### Who can enter

Entrants must be citizens or residents of Canada. Stories must be submitted over author's real names, but winning stories may be published over pseudonyms if necessary. The Body Politic will retain the option on first North American publication rights, but final copyright will remain with the authors.

The contest will be for short fiction by lesbians and with lesbian-relevant themes. (No poetry please.) Stories should be between 2500 and 3000 words.

Manuscripts must be type-written, double-spaced, on 81/2" x 11" paper. Two copies of each manuscript will be required. Stories cannot be returned, so please keep a copy for yourself.

#### When does it all happen

Entry deadline is December 31, 1978. Results will be announced in the April issue of The Body Politic.
The winning story will be published in May and the runners-up at any time after that. If entries are of sufficient quality and quantity, Pink Triangle Press may publish an anthology of the best short fiction.
