

WOMAN AS VIEWER

We, the Committee for Women Artists, are soliciting submissions for an art show entitled "WOMAN AS VIEWER" to be held at the Winnipeg Art Gallery from November 25 to December 14, 1975.

Women artists are invited to submit not more than ten slides of works in any media, figurative or abstract, from which works will be chosen by a jury of professional artists. The jury will also select one work which will be used on a 16" x 24" four colour poster to publicize the show. (The artist chosen will receive \$150.00 for the reproduction of her work.) Works will be insured in transit and return shipping costs will be provided. We would appreciate your co-operation in submitting your own work and in contacting other women who would welcome this opportunity to show their work. Slides must be submitted by September 26, 1975. Enclosed please find a poster which we hope you will be able to display.

Hopefully, "Woman as Viewer" will counteract the effect of an art show being presented by the Women's Committee of the Winnipeg Art Gallery. The Women's

Committee show is featuring women as the subject of art in the 19th and 20th centuries. This topic will necessitate the use of works by male artists and will inevitably perpetuate past stereotypes of women. "Woman as Viewer" will include only works by women in an effort to equalize past exclusion of women artists from major shows.

As well as this, we hope the works of art will exemplify the new consciousness of women who are attempting to overcome their traditional position of oppressing in society. Many women artists of today are seeking a new aesthetic which will express the female mode of existence in visual images. We anticipate works of art which will portray female rather than male conceptions. We hope this show will challenge conventional ideas about women and their view of themselves, of men, and of the world. We would like to bring a new female sensibility to the public.

We have obtained funding through the Secretary of State as part of the International Women's Year program.

The title of the show, "Woman as Viewer", emphasizes woman as one who sees rather than is seen, who does rather than is done to; woman as active, rather than passive.

Because this issue is so important and appreciated by so few in our society, we trust you will give special attention to our request.

WOMEN IN LITERATURE

If the purpose of literature, in Hamlet's words, "was and is, to hold as 'twere the mirror up to nature, to show virtue her own feature, scorn her own image, and the very age and body of the time his form and pressure," 1 what image of women does that mirror show?

Literature as taught in schools is a masculine mirror. What follows is supportive evidence, and a modest proposal to redress the balance in the teaching of secondary English, by emphasizing the role of women as fifty per cent of the human race.

Five years ago the Royal Commission on the Status of Women concluded, "...a woman's creative and intellectual potential is either underplayed or ignored in the education of children from their earliest years."

The brief to the Royal Commission on the Status of Women, submitted by the Manitoba Teachers' Society, in 1968, was no less critical; "Our boys and girls are stereotyped. Although a girl's interests, abilities, and attitudes are found to lie on a contimum ranging between masculine and feminine, a sharp distinction is made between a boy and a girl.....Very early in life the girl is taught to be a sex object.....When the young girl begins school, she already realizes that her future role as a wife and mother is of prime importance.... Early education of boys and girls is differentiated either consciously or unconsciously by teachers.... Throughout

the education of our youth, social attitudes determine the education received and in turn keep the attitudes fixed." 2

As Mike McGrady pointed out in the Winnipeg Free Press of June 5, 1971, "It begins at the beginning, in the Dick and Jane readers. Even in the title Dick comes first. Jane is silly, playful, essentially a frivolous sort. Dick, on the other hand, is practical, hardheaded, sensible.

"See that baby doll," said Jane
That doll can talk,
I want it.
I want a doll that talks."
"Oh, Jane," said Dick.
"You have two big dolls.
Do you want a baby doll, too?"
"Oh, I guess not," said Jane.
"I guess I have all the dolls I want."

From Dick and Jane we go to the world of fairy tales, where the image sharpens somewhat. The beauteous maiden spends her life--sometimes in sleep--waiting for the prince's magic kiss. She sews and cooks and spins while he is involved in acts of courage, the slaying of dragons and so forth.

And she reappears in more adult books—she is the secretary to the private eye; the glamorous other woman in a love triangle—always in the armchair. It is clear most writers have prized women for the same reasons they might prize a cocker spaniel—a fineness of line, a glossiness of pelt, an aristocratic stance, and above all else, an alertness in responding to commands."

Tennyson makes this very explicit in his narrative poem, "The Princess"—a young woman who insists on educational equality, until taught better by the Prince:

Man is the hunter; woman is his game
The sleek and shining creature of the chase;
We hunt them for the beauty of their skins;
They love us for it and we ride them down.

and

Man for the field and woman for the hearth;
Man for the sword and for the needle she;
Man with the head, and woman with the heart;
Man to command, and woman to obey;
All else confusion. 3

A generation of educators absorbed such ideals — and later the more advanced ideas of D. H. Lawrence.
