TAKING POWER IN THE EIGHTIES

It's been almost a year now since the Vancouver Organizing Committee took on hosting this Conference. From the beginning it was planned as a focus for lesbians to present who and what we are, and to help build a stronger movement. In the last year it's become even more clear to us how important this Conference can be.

With an unending economic slump, where we as women bear much of the brunt, and a turn in many areas to ultra conservatism, we have a lot to discuss. We continue to face all kinds of discrimination and harassment, from the loss of our children, our jobs, isolation from our families and friends to harassment by the psychiatric and medical institutions. But thousands of us are taking that risk and refusing the straitjacket of heterosexuality.

This Conference is an opportunity for us to come out as a movement. It's a chance for lesbians from all across the country and from many different backgrounds to exchange information and skills and to take away some important organizing ideas, contacts and networks. It is also an opportunity for us to give recognition to the artists and performers among us who are developing a positive lesbian image, and to present that image to the general public. And, of course it's a time for us to meet informally and have fun!

We took on an ambitious project for a small group, and there are ways that we have worked together that we want to share. From the beginning the Conference has been planned to represent the interest of all of us, especially the least powerful. Our meetings have been open to all women, and we have distributed three national mailings to get more input. We have included a large number of workshops from these requests, several of which are entirely new to most of us. Never before have we had such a good opportunity to discuss the effects of our lesbianism on every part of our lives. We have also invited our media and the establishment media to cover this event so that we can begin to counter the myths and stereotypes about us.

What happens after the conference?

Three days is a very short time, so we hope that every workshop and plenary session will present some practical suggestions for the future, for each of us to take away. We are going to publish the proceedings, including reports and resolutions from the workshops, a Plenary, photos of performances and art work, and what we have learned in organizing.


Too often in the past we have seen premature attempts to form a national organization and newsletter, without enough assurances of experienced women with time, resources and regional representation. We would like to propose that national networking continue on a more informal basis, with annual or biannual conferences based on links between women working on the same issues, for example, lesbian mothers and custody, lesbian health workers and lesbians in unionized and non-unionized workplaces.

Our experience has shown the value of a conference as a focus for all the myriad ways lesbian groups and individuals are organizing. We would hope that another centre, with sufficient resources and interested women could take on the next conference. From these smaller, but more practical beginnings we can begin to take our power as lesbians in the eighties!


VIOLENCE IN RELATIONSHIPS — facilitated by Susan

WOMAN TO WOMAN, the first ever Canadian lesbian art show, opens in Vancouver on May 18th. This show is dedicated to the celebration of lesbian lives. It is sponsored by the Woman to Woman Art Collective and is exhibited in conjunction with the 1981 Lesbian Conference to be held in Vancouver at Langara College on May 16, 17 and 18th.

The official opening of the art exhibit will be held on Monday, May 18th from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. It will run until May 30th. Exhibit hours are: Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Sunday from 4 to 8 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. On Friday May 29th at 8 p.m. there will be a special evening of performances featuring dance, video, poetry and a stand-up comic. Of particular interest will be a new film on lesbian lives.

The show represents the work of over thirty women artists. The mediums range from textiles, prints, oil paintings, Xerox, wood and clay sculpture, and photography.






