As Workers' Worldwide Celebrate Labour Day, let us take a moment to remember the achievements that women now enjoy, and reflect on the economic and social reality that continues to be a roadblock for women.

The International Labour Office states "Women swell ranks of working poor-lower wages and longer hours hinder women's progress."

- Women continue to work longer hours and are paid on average 25 percent less than men, but have made significant gains in entering formerly maledominated jobs in the labour force. The bottom line is that while more and more women are working, the greater majority of them are simply swelling the ranks of the working poor. Women's economic activities remain highly concentrated in lowwage, low-productivity and precarious employment.
- Women make up nearly 70 percent of the worlds poor and 65 percent of the world's illiterate. More than 45 percent of all the world's women (aged

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15-64) are now economically active. In industrialized countries, more than half of all women work, compared to roughly 37 percent of Western European women and 30 percent of US women just two decades ago.

- The majority of women earn on average about three-fourths of the male wage for the same work. Outside the agricultural sector in both developed and developing countries, the gap is not decreasing.
- Women's unemployment rates run from 50 to 100 percent greater than for men in many industrialized countries.
- Women hold less than six percent of senior management jobs in the world.
- In the 28 countries of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development, the number of women in the labour force grew by more than twice the rate for men between 1980 and 1990.

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unpaid work (in the home), while men spend between 5-15 hours in unpaid work.

- Some women have breached the glass ceiling to occupy top level jobs.
- Women are forming their own businesses at a greater rate than men in the United States.
- Pay equity laws adopted by many countries in both developed and developing regions have made a difference in women's pay.
- Improved working conditions including child care services and family-friendly workplaces and the social protection for some female workers has helped them reconcile work and family responsibilities.
- Collective bargaining has helped promote gender equality in many countries.
- More women are joining unions and unions are increasingly sensitive to gender issues.

Nonetheless, "Equality of opportunity and treatment for women in employment has yet to be achieved anywhere in the world."
