BC BENEFITS LEGISLATION SUPPORTS PARENTS AND CHILDREN

Legislation was introduced on July 22, 1996, that represents the final steps in overhauling BC's outdated welfare system.

Clark said "We're doing our part to make work a better deal than welfare and to help people gain independence. For the first time our new BC Family Bonus helps low-income working families with the cost of raising their kids. Youth Works ends welfare for young people and replaces it with opportunities to learn new skills and find a job. And today -- with more day care funding and the Healthy Kids dental and optical program -- we're making childcare a key element in our BC Benefits plan."

Also included in the five specific initiatives was a new Access to Independence initiative, in which people with disabilities will be streamed out of the welfare system, and a new Welfare to Work program for employable adults 25 and over to provide access to job search, job preparation, work experience or training, subject to availability.
