INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

Celebrating 82 years of Success, Struggle and Sisterhood

International Women's Day was first declared at an international congress in 1910 in. Copenhagen, Denmark that was attended by women from 17 countries.

March 8th was proposed by Clara Zetkin from Germany because on March 8, 1908, hundreds of women in New York city had demonstrated to demand the vote and the 8-hour work day, and to protest the poor working conditions of women in the factories. There were already signs of the outbreak of World War I, so she called on women to link their struggle for equal rights with the struggle to preserve peace. International Women's Day was established.

Eighty-two years later, in 1992, International Women's Day is celebrated around the world. In some countries it is a national holiday. In Canada, this is still a goal to be achieved, as are our goals for equality, peace and justice.

> International Women's Day has been celebrated in Winnipeg since 1922 and in Brandon since 1982. In activities throughout March, women in Manitoba will celebrate the achievements won, and renew our pledge for a better future.

BRANCH REPORTS Winnipeg Branch

Calling all feminists!!! It's time for action! This appears to be a time when our efforts are needed in many different areas, and all at the same time.

Jennifer Howard and I attended a three-day session of meetings in Ottawa at the end of January concerning the proposed Rape Shield legislation. It was a wonderful experience, meeting with about 65 other representatives from women's groups from across Canada. I would be hardpressed to think of a group of women whose voices were not represented there, and we worked together well and efficiently. The level of intelligence, collective experience, and solidarity in our meeting room was truly uplifting and inspiring.

We met to go over the new legislation in detail; discuss it, tear it apart, and revise it, and to strategize. The result was the beginning of a national lobby which, in short, will support the Bill if it includes our amendments. We were unified in our refusal to support it as it stands. However, over the course of our scheduled meetings, as well as those which formed over dinner etc., we began to envision a law with which we would be satisfied. (See page 8.)

Now, this lobby will not be successful without your participation. Call or write to your Member of Parliament, the Prime Minister, the Justice Minister (Kim Campbell), and the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women (Mary Collins) about your concerns. Call me at 453-3879 for more information about how you can help protect survivors of sexual assault from being further victimized in the courtroom.

In other Branch areas, MACSW had booths at the Manitoba Child Care Association Conference and at the conference "Confronting Violence in Lesbian Relationships". Shirley Forsyth presented a brief on behalf of MACSW regarding qualifications for the new Winnipeg Chief of Police. Joanne Levasseur is our representative on the Museum of Man and Nature's "Women of

Invention" community advisory committee. Joanne and Jean Snow reviewed the National Action Committee on the Status of Women's draft of the "Women's Charter". And Jenny, Karen Prychitko and I have drafted a brief which will be presented to the House of Commons committee examining the Rape Shield Bill.

In the exciting news department: the Welfare \$tarlets, Shauna Dempsey, and the Spectrum Cabaret have donated a portion of the proceeds from a show on February 27th to support MACSW. Thank you to all involved!

MACSW's resources depend on donations! BRANCH REPORTS

Brandon Branch

Six weeks into the job as the Brandon Administrative Coordinator for MACSW and I feel like I've come home. My first month was exciting, highlighted by an impromptu trip to Ottawa to attend the department of Justice's consultation conference on the proposed Rape Shield legislation. Andrea James, Winnipeg staffperson, and I flew to Ottawa where we met with feminists from across the country and Justice Minister Kim Campbell to make recommendations, which centred on making the legislation relevant to all women and avoiding abuses due to "judicial discretion" in admitting past sexual history of victims as evidence.

There was consensus among those who attended that a woman's past sexual history is NEVER relevant, but since the Supreme Court doesn't agree with us on that, we tried to make it as "rarely relevant" as possible. We also discussed ways to continue putting pressure on the government regarding the law. This battle is not over yet, and it's more important than ever that woman make their concerns known to the Minister. I brought back information on the bill which is in the office for anyone who wants to come and look it over.

I also spoke to a woman in Ottawa from INTER-CEDE, an advocacy group concerned with the rights of domestic workers. She told me of the Mulroney government's plans for changing the Foreign Domestics Movement program which would further restrict the rights of these workers, who are predominantly women of color. In other news, Brandon General Hospital will eliminate 33 nursing positions, 18 gynecology beds and 13 palliative care beds. The Manitoba Nurses' Union predicts 67 nurses will be laid off as a result. The local office of Planned Parenthood is undergoing some alarming changes. Two of the longterm employees have been discharged and the office is now only open half days. Planned Parenthood provides a crucial service to the women of Brandon, especially young women, and we are very concerned about now this service will be affected. Stay tuned...

We have two new reports in the Brandon office - "Women Against Poverty" results of last year's hearings on poverty conducted by the Alberta Status of Women Action Committee, and the report from the Public Utilities Board on MTS's proposed Call Management Services. Many groups and individuals who work with victims of abuse had expressed concern that these new services would damage their clients' rights to confidentiality and endanger their physical safety.

As a result of these concerns, provisions have been made to block the display of the phone numbers of: incoming callers to women's shelters, victims of abuse and persons sheltering victims of abuse. The service called "Call Return", which would enable users to recall previous numbers dialed, has been denied by the Board. In addition, MTS has been directed to monitor the services during the one-year trial period in consultation with women's shelters and other interested groups and to report their findings to the Public Utilities Board. Barring a complete denial of the application, these provisions are probably the best we could have hoped for. All those who made presentations should pat themselves on the back.

Brandon celebrations for International Women's Day will center around the Constitution, Comedy and Camaraderie. Marcelle Dolment, an artist from Quebec who's been active on the constitutional discussion, will be in Brandon March 6th, 7th and 8th. She'll be speaking at a public forum March 6th, at 7:30 at the Royal Oak Inn and will be meeting with women on a more informal basis throughout the weekend. As well there will be a showing of "Wisecracks," a new NFB production about female comedians, on March 8th at 3 p.m. in the Little Theatre, in the basement of the Education Building at Brandon University. Phone the Brandon office for more details.



MACSW joins Rape Shield lobby in Ottawa

For three days in late January, MACSW and other members of the women's movement met in Ottawa to strategize and revamp the proposed Rape Shield legislation and meet with Justice Minister Kim Campbell.

The opportunity to meet and forge ties with women outside of Manitoba, as well as discovering commonalities and gaining solidarity, was invaluable.

Background

Last August, the Supreme Court struck down the Rape Shield law--believing that it violated the right of accused rapists to a fair trial. The law, in theory at least, disallowed an accused rapist from using a victim's past sexual history as part of his defence.

Seven of the nine Supreme Court judges believed that a woman's past sexual history is sometimes relevant in sexual assault cases, a point with which the majority of the women's movement strongly disagrees.

Shortly after overturning the law, many women demanded that the Justice Minister either invoke the "notwithstanding" clause of the Charter to reinstate the Rape Shield or introduce new Rape Shield legislation. A coalition of national women's groups, including the Canadian Association of Sexual Assault Centres, the National Organization of Immigrant and Visible Minority Women, the Women's Legal Education and Action Fund, the Dis-Abled Women's Network, the Congress of Black Women, and the National Action Committee on the Status of Women was formed to look at drafting legislation.

Kim Campbell introduced new legislation on December 12, 1991, based somewhat on the recommendations of the coalition, and she agreed to fund about 65 representatives from front-line women's organizations for a consultation in Ottawa.

The government's proposed legislation is promising, but needs to be expanded and redefined.

What We Did

In three days, these representatives of the Canadian women's movement came up with a unified position on the Bill and presented it to Kim Campbell in a 90 minute meeting.

Specifically, we demanded a preamble to the Bill which would acknowledge the problems in access to justice experienced by Aboriginal women, Black women, women of colour, women who have a disability, elderly women, immigrant women, lesbians, women who are non-citizens, women refugees, sex trade workers, and children. We also proposed that a clause acknowledging the existenc of sexist myths about women's and men's sexuality be included in the legislation, and we said we wanted a clause added that would state clearly that, notwithstanding what the Supreme Court said, women's sexual history is never relevant.

We came up with a rewritten preamble and a list of changes to the body of the Bill; a media kit & mobilization plan; information about the parliamentary process, briefwriting, and lobbying; translation for all of the above, and a list of other related positions which we may choose to endorse individually. Women are truly amazing!

In the next month MACSW will be writing a brief we want to present to the House of Commons sub-committee dealing with the review of this Bill. A national network has been formed for the distribution of information so that we may all keep abreast of each others' actions. We need to petition Members of Parliament, specifically those sitting on the committee, to accept our endorsed amendments. And we need to send a strong message to the government that while this Bill is a start, it uses weak language, leaves too much to judicial discretion, and paints all women with the same brush when we all know our experiences vary. In short, it's not good enough. And we can make it better.

Your response to last month's MACSW survey about the performance and direction of MACSW has been incredible. In the first 2 weeks alone, about 75 responses flooded in---nearly 20% of MACSW members!

Although not conclusive yet, (we'll tabulate the final results and forward to the Provincial Coordinating Committee), here's a sneak preview of what you've said so far:

☐ 60% of respondents were MACSW members for more than 5 years (more than 30% more than 10 years!);

Half are active members in 3 or more other organizations;

☐ 96 % who expressed an opinion said MACSW does a good or very good job;

□ 98% rated ACTION good or very good (take heart those who expressed a concern about the "high" quality paper - printing is no more expensive than last year when ACTION was printed on plain bond. And we use recycled paper too! Folding it to mail in envelopes saves \$75 per issue.)

□ 60% of you say you're too busy to become more involved in MACSW

MACSW Members' Support Helps to Relaunch Herizons

Expected to reach its target goal of 3,000 charter subscribers within the next 2 weeks, the first issue of *Herizons* magazine will be at the printers in a few days.

MACSW members joined many other women's groups in supporting *Herizons* relaunch effort. December's issue of ACTION contained a copy of *Herizons* 'subscription brochure and about 125 MACSW members responded by sending in their subscription cheque!

Herizons ' shoestring budget relaunch project relied heavily on the exchange of mailing lists with other feminist organizations and periodicals across Canada to get all of its 50,000 subscription brochures into circulation.





Women Bring Grim Free Trade Warning

Angie Reynoso and Carmen Dominguez have a grim tale for Canadians contemplating their future under free trade with Mexico.

"What happened to us in El Paso could easily happen here," the two Mexican -Americans predicted at a public forum sponsored by OXFAM-CANADA and organized by CHOICES and CUSO.

"I'm sure you'll see a lot more Canadians losing jobs, a lot more businesses folding up and going south, and other people opening sweatshops here, paying only starvation wages," said Angie.

Angie and Carmen work for La Mujer Obrera (The Working Woman), a support group of 900 women who fight for their livelihood in a garment industry decimated by the "maquiladora" or free trade program in Mexico.

The 17,000 garment workers in El Paso,



85% of them women, face appalling conditions ---- 12 hour work days, no heat or air conditioning, no ventilation or fire escapes, and poor lighting.

Often they don't even get paid. "They are told by their boss that he's waiting for his buyer to pay him," Angie recounts.

"They wait four to six weeks. Then one day they go back and his sweatshop is closed. He declares bankruptcy, and then re-opens down the street under a new name, hiring new workers." -from an article by Susan White, OXFAM-Canada


Domestic Workers Fight Back

INTERCEDE, a national organization working to improve the status of domestic workers in Canada, is protesting a recent move by the federal government to restrict domestic workers right to settle permanently in Canada.

They want all equality-seeking supporters in the women's movement and labour movement to write the Minister of Employment and Immigration to protest their clamp down, which includes a move to make grade 12 a pre-requisite for domestic workers. Domestic workers across Canada have taken to the streets recently to protest the fact that they are already vulnerable to abuse and exploitation because of their unstable status in Canada and forced live-in working conditions. Intercede believes that domestic workers should enter Canada as immigrants, just like other workers for whose work there is a demand, and says in its recent newsletter, that "It is not only demeaning and abusive" to make domestics more vulnerable, "but racist...since most domestic workers are women of color."
