

## **Our Lives:**

Excerpts from the Review of the Situation of Women in Canada, 1993

he Review of the Situation of Women in Canada, 1993, proves beyond the shadow of a doubt that women are facing the strongest backlash in twenty five years. The Report, based upon the latest research by feminist activists and scholars and by the labour movement, is a stinging indictment of the neo-conservative agenda and its impact on the equality of women in Canada.

### Among the Report's findings:

For the first time in twenty five years, women's participation in the paid workforce is declining.

In 1993, 57.6% of all women were in the work-force, down from 58.4% in 1990. The most dramatic decrease was among young women between the ages of 15 and 24.

Official unemployment rates mask the extent of unemployment among women.

While the official rate in March 1993 was set at 11.1%, the real rate of

unemployment among women was much higher. Women's unemployment is hidden in part-time work, as many women who would prefer full-time work take part-time jobs to make ends meet. If we take into consideration the women who are forced into part-time work because of the lack of full-time jobs. and the women who have become discouraged by the impossibility of finding a job and have dropped out of the workforce, women's real rate of unemployment is closer to 20%. The Report also found that one in every five unemployed women is the head of her household, and that older women tend to be unemployed for longer periods of time.

Over two thirds (68.3%) of parttime workers are women.

Ninety four percent (94%) of all newly created jobs are in the low paying service sector, and are

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### filled primarily by women and young people.

These jobs are characterized by poor working conditions, and limited - and often non-existent - benefits.

Seventy-two percent (72%) of workers in the ten lowest paying jobs are women, while only 20% of workers in the

# ten highest paying jobs are women.

One quarter of women in the workforce earn an average of \$9,000 a year.

The wage gap between women and men has not decreased, despite recent claims to the contrary.

On average, women earn 61.5 % of what men earn, and the wage gap increases with age, with older

women workers earning much less than their male counterparts.

The impact of these economic changes is greater on women of colour, immigrant women, and women with disabilities who face added discrimination.

The evidence is clear. Tory policies don't work—ask a woman who wants to.
