PRESIDENT'S LETTER

The first meeting of the new Executive took place on April 11/12. We had been due to meet at the Annual General Meeting, but the business meeting ran over timetable. It was a successful meeting and we took decisions in the following areas:

Pat Preston, one of the Vice-Presidents of the organization, sent notice of her resignation to the meeting. She is joining the Hon. Lloyd Axworthy as his press secretary and considers the new job a conflict of interest with her role at NAC. The Executive agreed that "His Lloydship" needs all the help he can get and that Pat has a long and outstanding feminist record.

The Constitution decrees how a new vice-president is selected and the voting procedure brings Jill Porter into the role. Replacing Jill Porter as member-at-large is the next person in order of votes cast at the Annual General Meeting - Mary-Anne Nixon. She will be approached and asked to serve.

The contributions of all Executive members ensured that we got through an extremely busy agenda. The meeting was highly active!! To quote Flo Kennedy:

"There's no Movement if each one of us doesn't move. Personally, I'll support anything that's off its ass."

Well, the new NAC Executive is "off its ass".

Our next Executive meeting will concentrate on setting priorities for 1981-82. We have multiple committees, lots of resolutions, a fair amount of ongoing business and a number of very major policy issues to sort out. It will be a difficult session but I feel we will enter it with a good ability to work through the problems and get resolution.

#### DECISIONS MADE AT EXECUTIVE MEETING

Executive Meeting Dates: May 2/3 & June 20/21

The final dates for the remainder are not yet settled - Executive members are checking for conflicts with other major meetings, but we will meet in September, October, December, January, February.

Dates for these and the Annual General Meeting will be announced at the next meeting. Location of the meetings will be decided at the next Executive Meeting. Agendas for the meetings will be set by the Table Officers on April 21 for the May meeting, June 2 for the June meeting.

#### 2. STATUS

Last year's Editorial committee spent most of its time getting funding for STATUS according to the direction of the Executive which was for a quarterly bilingual magazine of newstand quality. It managed to get a CEIC job creation grant and was ready to restart STATUS pending approval of the new Executive.

The meeting was overwhelmingly in favour of reinstating STATUS, but in a less glossy non-newstand quality edition.

The motion sums it up:

"That we produce:

(1) a quarterly magazine

(2) non-newstand quality

(3) approx. 2000 copies to member groups & subscribers

(4) with one paid staff person

(5) we appeal to other journals, eg. Chatelaine, Canadian Women's Studies, for a page to include NAC information

(6) that we request services on a contributed basis from

Doris Anderson, Shelagh Wilkinson, and others (7) spend as close as possible to \$30,000 in all

Amendment: Bearing in mind whatever growth opportunities may exist in this year for distribution purposes only."

In light of this changed format and direction, it was decided to reject the CEIC grant which had been obtained.

We wish the new Editorial board good luck. It is a very demanding role in the organization.

#### 4. Pensions Conference Follow-up

The Executive approved the submission of a proposal to Monique Begin for a series of pension seminars to be co-sponsored by NAC and its regional member groups.

The purpose of the seminars is to educate women on the issues of pension policy as it relates to them and to build an aware lobby for change.

The proposal arises out of the concern felt by NAC Executive members who were delegates at the Pensions Conference. They felt that the level of awareness on the issues was extremely low.

We'll keep you informed on the progress of this.

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5. Canadian Advisory Council on the Status of Women

NAC Executive passed the following motion re the Constitutional Conference to be held by the Advisory Council on May 29/30, 1981:

"Moved that NAC officially boycott the Canadian Advisory Council on the Status of Women Conference on the Constitution in May, make this position public, and inform member groups of this action."

Jean Wood was interviewed by the press and we issued a press release on the subject:

"The National Action Committee on the Status of Women, at its Executive meeting on the weekend, decided to boycott the constitutional conference of the Canadian Advisory Council on the Status of Women to be held at the end of May, 1981.

'The Council completely lacks credibility in the eyes of Canadian feminists,' said spokesperson Jill Porter, a Vice-President of the National Action Committee.

The CACSW has postponed two conferences on the constitution at a time when they were crucial to the debate. Canadian women organized substitute forums to ensure their views were heard by government.

NAC continues to urge the CACSW to have an external review of the role of the Council in representing the views of women to government."

The Executive also authorized a small committee to look at the terms of reference of an external review of the CACSW and how women should be represented to government, and bring back ideas on this to the May meeting.

#### Roles & Responsibilities

Last year's Executive did very good work in defining the roles of the committees.

This meeting, we defined the role of the Table Officers and assigned the task of defining roles of the Vice-Presidents and Regional Representatives. When these are approved by the Executive, the intention is to bring them to the AGM for inclusion in the NAC Constitution.

This greater clarity will enable nominees for the NAC Executive to make realistic decisions about what tasks they would like to undertake on the Executive.

## Action!!!

#### DROP OUT CLAUSE - CANADA PENSION PLAN

The recent Ottawa Conference on Pensions overwhelmingly endorsed the concept of the Drop-out provision (i.e. time spent without income while raising children need not be included in calculating average earnings, for a pension).

The federal government and every province but Ontario and B.C. has endorsed this concept. But Ontario has exercised a veto (because of its size).

NAC Members and Friends are urged to write, phone, etc., to the Ontario and British Columbia Provincial Ministers and/or Premiers (The Hon. Frank Miller, Ontario Treasurer; The Hon. Hugh A. Curtis, Minister of Finance, B.C.) urging that they agree to inclusion of this provision immediately.

NATIVE INDIAN WOMEN'S OCCUPATION OF OFFICE

Sandra Lovelace, Barbara Nicholas, Cheryl Lynn Bear, Glenna Perley, and Sharon Elizabeth Paul were charged, convicted and fined \$200 for "unlawfully occupying and interfering with the normal carrying on of business" in a building designated by chief and council for business purposes (see December 1980 NAC MEMO).

The women are appealing in the provincial appeal court in Woodstock, N.B., on Tuesday, April 14. They will appear in that court with their children, and have decided not to pay the fine. They will likely go to jail if the appeal is denied. They very much need the support of women in Canada. NAC is sending telegrams, letters, etc., to Premier Hatfield and the Attorney General of New Brunswick, the Prime Minister, The Hon. John Munro (Minister of Indian Affairs), women Senators and women MP's urging them to support the women's fight for better living conditions and justice.

UPDATE: April 14 - Caroline Ennis (NAC Executive) called. The judge was sympathetic. Judgment in about 10 days. The women will go to jail, if the verdict goes against them. Caroline will keep us posted. Letters supporting the women may be mailed C/o Caroline Ennis, General Delivery, Station A, Toronto E3B 4Y1

#### SANDRA LOVELACE - HUMAN RIGHTS CASE

Sandra Lovelace is still fighting for all Indian women. She is one of about 5,000 Indian women who have lost their status in the last decade. The effect of this lost status can mean - explulsion from reserves, denial of burial rights, loss of benefits, and loss of status to their

For more than 10 years Trudeau governments have promised to amend Section 12 1(b) of the Indian Act. Sandra has been forced to take her case to the U.N. Human Rights Committee in Geneva. Messages can still be sent to the Committee urging support for her case:

## NAC ANNUAL MEETING 1981

NAC's Ninth Annual Meeting was held in Ottawa, March 13-16, 1981. This year we met at the Holiday Inn which coped ably with the 172 delegates and 38 observers from 104 member groups and 134 other observers. Friday night led off with Alexa McDonough, newly-elected leader of the Nova Scotia New Democratic Party, speaking on "Women as a Political Force", followed by an informal reception which gave everyone the chance to get acquainted.

Saturday started with a buffet breakfast and speeches from the candidates for the NAC Executive. Hugette Labelle, Under Secretary of State addressed the full plenary which then broke into workshops for the rest of the day. All delegates have received the Post Conference Mailing which includes minutes and resolutions from the meeting and they have been asked to share this information with their member groups.

Saturday evening was devoted to fun and games. These included the Red Rose Review - a great group of women performers (see excerpt), the presentation of the National Pacifier Award, a thank you to the outgoing President and Executive, and a surprise presentation to the oldest inhabitant of the Executive, the Past, Past President, Kay Macpherson.

On Sunday, discussion of Resolutions and the business meeting continued overtime, which meant shrinking the lobby workshop.

Nevertheless, Monday's lobby was one of the best ever, with about 100 women in attendance and a somewhat better than usual showing of the party caucuses (approx. 16 NDP, 18 PC and 20 LIB, including 3 Cabinet Ministers). Jean Wood, our new President, reviewed the responses of the Parties - 'playing them back' to get agreement. These responses will soon be available for publication.



## REPORTS

### Micro Electronics Conferences

Members of the NAC sub-committee on Impact of Technology attended two conferences on the Impact of the New Technology of the Work Force. The first conference was a one-day seminar organized by Women's Programmes, Secretary of State, to give women's groups an opportunity to gear up for the following three-day international conference hosted by the Women's Bureau, Labour Canada.

Consensus reached in both forums was that:

- Women are facing massive structural unemployment because the jobs displaced by technological change are the jobs that women do. As yet, neither government nor industry is considering corrective action on the scale required.
- The fact that so few women are unionized discourages the development of the policies and programs required to protect women's interests when the new technology is introduced.
- 3) The potential exists for the development of cottage industry jobs, micro-chip base, and linked by telecommunications. While potentially liberating (especially for information generators) controls must be introduced to ensure that home-work is not used as a cop-out for daycare, as a way of discouraging unionization, alienating workers, or fragmenting the workforce. Such negative outcome are particularly likely for information processors (such as word processing and data entry operators, the vast majority of whom are women).
- 4) Health and safety issues associated with the new technology are largely unknown.

### NATIONAL PENSIONS CONFERENCE

Jean Wood and Lynn Sullivan of NAC's Pensions Committee attended the National Pensions Conference, March 31-April 2, in Ottawa. The conference included delegates representing the pension industry, employers, unions, women, people with handicaps, and pensioners.

The conference agenda highlighted four major issues: Pensions coverage, Vesting, Locking-In, and Portability, Indexing, and Women and Pensions. NAC stressed that improvements in the first three areas are all important for women. NAC also raised a number of issues of specific concern to women.

These include coverage during periods of pregnancy leave and child rearing, pensions for part-time workers, changes to public plans - Canada Pension Plan, Old Age Security, and Guaranteed Income Supplement, and improvements in Survivor Income Benefits. The last point was initially the only issue raised by business representatives. NAC representatives expressed disappointment with this.

NAC's Pension Committee has already received input on pension reform from some members. Further input and ideas would be welcome.

NAC will be revising its discussion paper on pensions based on this input, as well as the discussions that took place at the Pensions Conference.

We will be pursuing ways of disseminating information on women and pension reform, and facilitating lobbying on this issue.

### Women & SPORT CONFERENCE - McMASTER UNIVERSITY, HAMILTON - MARCH 18/19, 1981

Dorothy Richardson attended this on behalf of NAC. According to Dorothy, the most significant achievement was that by the end of the session there was a consensus that sport had a feminist connection. A number of topics were discussed and a new organization was formed to further the cause - contact Dorothy Richardson, C/o the NAC Office, for more information, or (403) 454-8096.

### ONTARIO FEDERATION OF LABOUR - DAY CARE

Jean Woodsworth, former NAC Executive member, represented NAC at the recent OFL sponsored Day Care Conference in Toronto, April 11. She spoke of NAC's involvement and mentioned some of the resolutions of the previous year.

In Kitchener, the Kitchener-Waterloo Status of Women Committee was represented at another OFL sponsored meeting. These are being held throughout Ontario, and the Federation of Labour is anxious to have the involvement of women's groups.

We would like to hear further reports on these meetings.

## \$\$\$ funding ¢¢¢

#### G O O D N E W S \$ \$ \$ \$ \$

Secretary of State Women's Programmes has to-date had its budget expanded to \$4.1 million.

In 1980-81, the program had an "A" budget of \$700,000 and a "B" budget added later in the year of \$500,000.

This new figure represents a big increase and we believe it is the beginning of a 5-year plan to build up Women's Program funding to "appropriate levels".

Women's Programming is developing criteria for distributing these new funds. NAC has asked to be involved in that process.

The budget of \$4.1 million has \$1.1 million going to Women's programs operations, \$3 million to women's programming. The immediate criteria for the distribution of the \$3 million are 2/3 to project funding, 1/3 to core funding for women's groups.

ALL grants for Women's programs rests now with Secretary of State Women's Programs. The Coordinator's Office of the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women who used to grant money (\$90,000 budget in total) now does not do so. However, the \$90,000 budget is retained there for educational and research purposes.

We hope to produce (in a future issue) a list of the areas in Secretary of State where other sources of funding is available.

NAC has met with Secretary of State staff and received a verbal commitment to substantially increased funding.

CONGRATULATIONS TO NAC'S FUNDING COMMITTEE OF 1980-81 which contributed greatly to an awareness of the miserable level of funding for women's groups. We believe the committee in the extensive lobbying it did, helped make the increase happen.

The Committee intended always to provide NAC with a core funded government base on which to build diversified funding. This is still the aim of NAC and all volunteer groups; the resolutions of the Annual General Meeting supported a diversified base and the new Executive is already working on it.

Over the past several years, there has been a growing demand for women's studies courses in educational institutions, social service agencies, government, and industry.

The demand has seldom been met by positive action. The reason that women's studies have been neglected is that educators have found assembling a curriculum too time-consuming, and finding pertinent resources in this new educational field much too difficult.

The OECA has sought to remedy this problem. We have developed a Women's Studies Video Resource Catalogue. Designed in conjunction with leading educators in this field, a collection of video programs available from TVOntario and related film and print

resources have been formed into a package to help educators find the necessary resources to form their courses.
