A BIT OF HISTORY

The National Council of Women of Canada, of which the St. Catharines Local Council of Women is an affiliate, was founded in 1893, by Lady Aberdeen, wife of the Governor General of Canada at that time.

The National Council of Women of Canada, has been in federation with the International Council of Women since 1897, and is one of the 72 National Councils of Women, worldwide, so federated.

The International Council of Women was founded in Washington, D.C. in 1888, and has Class 1 Consultative status at the United Nations.

"Our comprehension of one another's circumstances, needs and difficulties and methods of thought, may be poor and weak at first, but it will surely grow and strengthen if we go forward grasping that magic wand of love, determined not merely to TOLERATE one another's opinions, but to UNDERSTAND one another and to understand the value that underlies each one's work."

HOW THE COUNCIL FUNCTIONS

- Council is organized to function at various levels International, National, Provincial and Local.
- The International Council is composed of National Councils of Women, in federation.
- The <u>National</u> Council is composed of national organizations, provincial councils and local councils, in federation. Its function is to take action on national matters and to inform and serve its members.
- The <u>Provincial</u> Council is composed of local councils, within its boundaries and provincially organized societies in federation. It takes action on provincial matters.
- The <u>Local</u> Council is composed of organizations within its community in federation, and is responsible for action with respect to the welfare and progress in its area.
- <u>Projects</u> may be initiated and <u>resolutions</u> introduced by Federated Associations, Special or Standing Committees, Committee of Officers or Executive Committee, but <u>not</u> by individuals.
- After study and a majority vote by Council, action may be taken on a project or resolution.
- Many resolutions require action either by Federal or Provincial governments for implementation. The <u>Parliamentary Committees</u> of the National Council and Provincial Councils request and are accorded interviews with the Prime Minister of Canada and the Premiers and members of their Cabinets. Local Councils meet with their Mayors and City Councils.
 - Resolutions of the International Council of Women are implemented through action taken by National Councils of Women.

LOCAL MILESTONES

St. Catharines Local Council of Women 1918 established Council urges establishment of Pre-Natal 1930 clinic. Council conducts registration of unem-1931 ployed women and girls, and urges employers to take on extra help. Council joins with the YWCA, Business & 1934 Professional Women and Zonta to form a Big Sisters' club. Council asks for a Juvenile court. 1937 Council supports the building of an arena. 1938 Council requests City Council hire a Social 1939 worker. Council completes survey of Day Care 1967 Nurseries and takes seat on city's safety council. Council conducts poverty and the elderly 1970 survey. Council publishes 'Women of Action' 1976 book featuring 125 local women. Council hosts 'Women in Politics' seminar 1977 and backs women candidates in municipal election. Council compiles data on programmes for 1984 women. Council spearheads drive for Blue Box 1987 programme.
