The Women's Press is pleased to announce its tenth anniversary. Moving toward the end of our first decade in publishing, we again reaffirm our commitment to bringing material of importance from the women's movement to the attention of Canadian readers. Ten years ago, the Press emerged as part of the creative upsurge of small publishing ventures in Canada that were struggling to find a place in Canadian publishing. In the spring of 1972, it was incorporated as a non-profit, no-share company. Today, The Women's Press is fortunate to be one of the few publishing houses established in that exciting period to have survived the economic vicissitudes of the past few years.

Since its inception, *The Women's Press* has published 44 books. Our titles encompass books for children, adult fiction, theoretical essays, and historical studies. A large number of these publications have been "firsts" in their fields. In 1977 we produced the first study on rape in Canada, *Rape: The Price of Coercive Sexuality*, and in 1978 we published what is still the only comprehensive examination of day care in Canada, *Good Day Care: Fighting For It, Getting It, Keeping It.*

Many other titles have received critical acclaim. Women at Work: Ontario, 1850-1930 won the City of Toronto Book Award for 1974. The True Story of Ida Johnson was a runner-up for Books in Canada best first novel award of 1977. Come With Us, Overnight Adventure and Good Times, Bad Times — Mummy and Me are on the Children's Book Centre list of the best 100 children's books in Canada. The Travels of Ms. Beaver has just been selected by a children's jury in an Ontario library system as one of its ten favourite children's books. And the Everywoman's Almanac, which we put together annually, has been called the best of its kind anywhere.

The Women's Press collective consists of fifteen women, five of whom are staff and the rest volunteers. The collective is our decision- and policy-making body. Collective members, together with women outside the collective, participate in manuscript groups, and are involved in the day-to-day business of running a publishing house. The two full-time and three part-time women on staff handle finance and marketing, promotion, editing, and production.

Our books are distributed by the University of Toronto Press in Canada, Bookpeople in the United States, and Writers and Readers in England, and we have a professional sales force across Canada. Orders that come through our office show that people know our books as far away as New Zealand and the Solomon Islands.

Within three months of release, the 13,000 copy run of the last Everywoman's Almanac was sold out! For the first time, it had to be reprinted. More than anything this shows that steadily increasing numbers of women, both in Canada and around the world, are buying and using the Everywoman's Almanac. The reasons why: it's easy to carry in purse or pocket; and besides being a day calendar and address book with note space, it also provides useful information to its reader. It really does have something for every woman.

The 1982 edition focuses on the very timely theme of women and health. Each month is introduced with interviews that address the varied aspects of health and the medical industry. Doctors and nurses present their views; physical fitness, environmental issues, prenatal care, childbirth and mental health are examined. Areas of concern like drugs, preventative medicine, contraception and health in the workplace are also some of the topics discussed.

In addition to the interviews, information on patients' rights and health care is provided. Everywoman's Almanac 1982 lists women's health groups, a bibliography of pertinent reading material, and women's centres across the country. And all the information is presented in a format that is at once usable and entertaining. The weekly two-page spreads are illustrated by original photographs, cartoons and drawings.

Everywoman's Almanac 1982 is a fun-to-carry book that is useful and informative. It will remain a valued companion throughout the year.

Letters from China

Pointed, often hilarious, always engrossing, Letters From China is a western woman's day-to-day account of her perceptions and experiences in 1980 China. Maureen Hynes, long-time activist in the women's movement and teacher of English as a second language (ESL), had for years had an active interest in China and dreamed of teaching there. In the spring of 1980 she was selected as an ESL teacher under a short-term cultural exchange program with China sponsored by the Canadian Department of External Affairs. Writing home to friends, associates and family, Ms. Hynes paints a vivid picture of her life as a language teacher in a country which, for most North Americans, remains shrouded in mystery even today.

From the letters the reader learns of the after-effects of the Cultural Revolution and the priority of modernization which governs China now. Through bitingly humorous narratives, Ms. Hynes also describes the effects of the 'bright red tape' which caused almost daily havoc in her life, and introduces us to a cast of characters who come to life for the reader as the letters progress.

Letters From China combines personal day-to-day perceptions with thoughtful overall insights. Supplementing the letters are an introduction, diary excerpts, and photographs. Together they provide an engaging picture of one woman's reactions, living and working as a 'foreign expert' in China.

The Seam Allowance: Industrial Homework in Canada

Laura C. Johnson with Robert E. Johnson

The poor working conditions for workers inside Canada's clothing factories have received considerable attention for many years, but there has been relatively little information about the conditions faced by *homeworkers*, the thousands of women in the garment industry who make clothing, uniforms, linens, toys and other articles in their homes.

Homework is part of what is known as the "underground economy." It is a highly secretive phenomenon, hidden in basements and closets, and not subject to the same scrutiny and regulation as factory work. Homeworkers take work from factories to be completed in their own homes, using machinery, equipment and utilities that they pay for themselves. These workers are not unionized, nor are they adequately protected by employment standards legislation. Significantly, homeworkers are all women and most of them are immigrants.

This study investigates the conditions of homework. Over forty homeworkers were interviewed as were employers, government officials and 'trade union representatives. Combining comprehensive data with a detailed analysis and photographs, *The Seam Allowance* exposes a major injustice against women in the workforce.

They will enjoy the humorous anecdotes of her childhood, be enthralled by her forays into the wilderness, and be tickled by the eccentricities of her lifestyle.

Lucie didn't know that summer would change her life.

The time was 1946. The place, Valleyfield, Quebec, a one-industry town where the major employer was forcing people to work 10 hours a day, six days a week. Conditions were horrible and pay was less than twenty-five cents an hour. The employees were tired, angry and fed-up with the unfair treatment they were receiving. They wanted something better, and were willing to fight to get it.

Through the eyes of Lucie, young adolescents are introduced to a memorable event in Canadian history—an event which brought a town of thousands to its feet, had a mayor and provincial premier battling and made newspaper headlines across the country. Accompanied by photographs taken at the time, *One Proud Summer* tells the gripping tale of the three-month historic fight of textile workers to win the right to unionize.



Quilt

In the eyes of the menfolk, making a quilt in the heat of the summer is somewhat odd. But Sam, an old woman grieving the death of her husband, perseveres. She calls together Hazel and her other friends to complete the task. The quilt, like Hazel's pickle-making, is a way of doing things, a tradition with its own ritual and meaning. As it nears completion, it comes to represent more than Sam's obsession; it embodies the stories told in its making, the collective effort of the women, the history of its pieces.

Myrt, the young outsider seeking temporary refuge with Sam from her husband's violence, has no patience for the ways of the older women who are at work on the quilt. Numbed, defeated, she smokes endless cigarettes, daydreams about the soap operas and worries about Ralph, the lonely, frustrated husband who resorts to alcohol to deaden his pain. The resolution of this relationship tragically dramatizes the dilemmas facing all the characters in their desire to understand what living really means.

Set in rural Nova Scotia, this wonderfully evocative novel examines a day in the lives of these three women. Beautifully written, in a language that is at once powerful and haunting, Quilt explores the bonds that hold people together and the tensions that disrupt their normal routines.

Donna E. Smyth has published many short stories. Her two plays, Susanna Moodie and Giant Anna, are in the repertoire of Nova Scotia's Mermaid Theatre. She is co-ordinating editor of Atlantis: A Women's Studies Journal and teaches creative writing, English and Women's Studies at Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia.

Housewives are responsible for a whole series of activities that appear intangible but have to do with keeping a marriage going, creating a pleasant environment in the home, co-operating with husbands to ensure a steady family income and involving the family in the larger community.







This book combines the first major Canadian study of rape with a theoretical analysis of its social causes. Part One examines all rape cases reported to the Metropolitan Toronto police in 1970. Part Two interprets the empirical data, criticizes traditional legal and academic theories of rape, and recommends specific changes in the law, judicial procedures and police practices.

Lorenne Clark and Debra Lewis define rape within the broad historical context of women's social, legal and economic status, and place responsibility for the problem upon a particular set of social relations. They show rape to be only the most violent manifestation of the coercive sexuality that pervades our entire culture, an inescapable by-product of a society based on inequality and male domination, and a problem that can be eliminated through social change.

Both authors were founding members of the Toronto Rape Crisis Centre. They bring to this work a long involvement with the women's movement, as well as an extensive background in law, philosophy and the social sciences.

Using the appealing photograph-and-excerpt format, A Harvest Yet To Reap tells the personal stories of women who survived the Canadian frontier. From contemporary interviews, diaries and newspaper accounts, the authors have assembled a picture of the lives of these pioneer women; the trip by CPR, the first long, searching look at the homestead, and then the work — the endless hours of toil in the house, in the barnyard and in the field.

Yet the story is not all grim. The photographs fully confirm the pleasure prairie women took in their key roles as mothers, wives, teachers and community organizers of prairie culture. The last chapters, which relate the struggle for the vote, capture the backroom drama of the women's confrontations with the narrow-minded politicians who tried to stem the tide of woman's suffrage.

The book's parent project, the prizewinning NFB film Great Grand Mother, was directed by Lorna Rasmussen and Anne Wheeler. In collaboration with Linda Rasmussen and Canadace Savage, they created a book with a visual format which remains true to the spirit of the film.

The claim of Canadian women for justice is a "not unreasonable" one, wrote Nellie McClung. So it was that our grandmothers campaigned for temperance and the vote, seeking in this way to enlarge what most felt was the proper sphere of women—to soften the rough edges of our social order.

Twelve of Canada's best historians of women have made a path-breaking analysis of women's part in the great reform upsurge of the 1880s through the 1920s. It begins with Linda Kealey's panorama of the times, followed by Wayne Roberts' theoretical article treating alternate currents to the "maternal feminism" that defined this movement; Deborah Gorham also does this in her article on Flora MacDonald Denison.

The francophone women's movement in Quebec is dealt with by Marie Lavigne, Yolande Pinard, and Jennifer Stoddart. Then Carol Bacchi moves the discussion to the West, where farm and labour organizations took up the suffrage issue.
