RHONDA ABRAMS:

Rhonda Abrams is a prolific video artist. The National Gallery permanent collection owns two of her tapes. She's had video screenings across Canada. She credits a strong influence on her aesthetics from Hollywood musicals. JOHN MCKEOWN has been singing on the country circuit since he left his Thunder Bay home, eight years ago. While on the road, out west, he was discovered by Ms. Abrams, who brought him to Toronto, where he has been enchanting audiences ever since.

THE SUGAR BUSHMAN:

Highlighting the author's concerns and sentiments affecting Canada's Hinterland. The Sulfer Dioxide and Acid Rain, adding stress to the forest ecosystem, is the unofficial cause of the increasing decline of the Maple. Families in Ontario and Quebec, who have been sugaring for generations, have lost an important source of income and a family tradition. The sugarbush disapperance, is not only a loss of heritage, it is a warning; it foreshadows the death of more and more species. MAKKA KLEIST:

Makka Kleist is an Inuit actor from Greenland who toured the world with Tutak Theatre before coming to Toronto in 1983. She founded <u>SeaCows</u>, a two-woman theatre ensemble, with Monique Mojica and has appeared in several plays, most recently in the 1986 Rubarb Festival.

THERE WAS AN OLD WOMAN:

This piece is based on the central figure in Inuit mythology, the Mother of the Ocean or Woman of the Deep. In this version of the tale, Sassumap Arna surfaces in Lake Ontario.

KRISANTHA SRI BHAGGIYADATTA:

Author of The Only Minority is The Bourgeoisie, co-author, with Dionne Brand, of Rivers Have Sources, Trees Have Roots, a book on racism. Editor of THE LANKA REVIEW, a newsletter which exposes Candian complicity in the genocide in Sri Lanka. Recently organized the Labour Council of Metropolitan Toronto's workshops on Racism with Black, Chinese, and South Asian Trade Unionists. Currently working on the Support Committee for John Persaud, and the Ad Hoc Committee for Wei Fu.

THE ONLY MINORITY IS THE BOURGEIOSIE-AN ACT: NEWS YOU WILL NEVER SEE, STORIES YOU WILL NEVER HEAR, THINGS YOU DON'T WANT TO KNOW:

Based on the book of poems, this act strategizes against the dominant culture of fear (hard and soft): Television cop shows. The RCMP on picture postcards. Missionaries on the home front. Advertisements from the business section Imperialism and sex appeal. Apartheid (Canada) Ltd. The act outlines this contemporary culture as an act of exploitation of the labour of black peoples.
