Funding for the publication project was received from Women's Program, Secretary of State.

Thoughts and Reflections About Banff Conference

At least 1,150 women attended the recent Women in a Violent Society conference in Banff. Much was said at the conference and considerable discussion continues in its wake among women in the community. Mainstream media gave some coverage, but by and large this coverage amounts to little more than a testament to the power of omission. The following are excerpts from articles written by two women attending the conference who give their thoughts and perceptions. The two are: Anne McGrath, vice-president of the National Action Committee (NAC) and Nancy Mereska, ASWAC regional representative.

Anne McGrath:

-"The tears, frustration and anger at (the recent) conference on women and violence were entirely to be expected. The emotions generated by the subject, the complexities of the issues and the exclusivity of the event combined to produce intense emotional and volatile discussions, debate and arguments...."

-While the conference went part way toward providing a national forum for women to address the issue of male violence toward women, "unfortunately the conference itself was not accessible to those women who are struggling to increase the inclusivity of feminism. Women of colour, aboriginal women, women with disabilities, working class and poor women were excluded by the location, cost, format and content...."

-"...As Rosemary Brown pointed out...the existence of racism did not depend on white women's ability to That racism was perceive it. experienced by the women of colour is true and it is encumbent on the white women present to acknowledge that experience and act on it whether or not we intended or perceived those actions to be racist."

"...While reports that focus on the divisiveness of many of the issues are certainly true, they do not embrace

existence "...The racism [does] not depend on white women's ability to perceive it."

the strength, vitality and power generated through the collective experience of addressing issues that touch our lives as women so fundamentally. No attention has been paid to the fact that this was an incredibly successful, oversold conference bringing together 1,150 for three days in 68 workshops....Feminists have often noted that it is only when we are faced with turmoil and acrimony that the mainstream media picks up on our events and provides serious column inches...."

"...We have precious few opportunities to come together to share our collective rage, passion and wisdom."

-"...Whenever come together to discuss male vilence against women there is division. This is not only healthy as a process that leads us to more meaningful agreements and strategies, it is also inevitable, given the way our governments have forced us to work. Chronic underfunding--not only of the grassroots feminist services that named the reality of male villence and organized the serices to assist the feminist also of victims--but create working 10 organizations economic, social and political changes to further women's equality, make it almost impossible for us to meet and devise our strategies..."

-"...When women have the opportunity to attend a conference such as this there is a great deal of work to do in a very short time....It is extremely unfortunate that while many of the controversial items were bubbling among the conference delegates, we were subjected to long, patronizing, political and pointless speeches by federal government bureaucrais and federal and provincial cabinet ministers....While we were treated to speeches from some very powerful and riveting feminists, there was very little opportunity to discuss as a group the reality of Canadian women's lives, the violence we experience, the day-to-day strategies that we use to heal ourselves and the feminist political action that we need "

-Feminists have been working hard 10 end vilence women,"...but we have had precious few opportunities to come together to share our collective rage, passion and wisdom. The CMHA conference was part of that work and it will be difficult and painful, but it is necessary for us to confront our divisions, distrust weaknesses to create a stronger movement that is capable of doing, as Sandra Butler noted, '...what we set out to do in the first place, and that is ending violence against women'."

Nancy Mereska

...I am going to highlight the messages given by the keynote speakers: Andrea Dworkin, feminist activist and writer; Butler, feminist activist and author of Conspracy of Silence--one of the first recorded documentations on incest; Shirley Turcott, survivor and activist; Kate Millett, writer and anti-psychiatric activist; Rose Mar Brown, global activist and president of MATCH.

Andrea Dworkin

-I could have entitled her talk "Sick to Death". She spoke of being sick to death of the amnesia of society when it comes to attitudes toward women and the violence they suffer....Although the Hollywood version about the pool hall gang rape, The Accused, ended with victory, the real life story ended with the woman who had been raped committing suicide.

 Andrea addressed violence as a political institution in the family and in the capitalist scheme of things....That actions against men and institutions that hurt women need to be real. "Stop men who hurt women," she said, "Get them jailed or get them killed."

Sandra Butler

-I would give her speech the title A Holistic View of Feminism. She spoke of the urgency we have to be with other women, to feel deeply with other women and to celebrate ourselves.

"As we age, we have less certainties and more concerns and urgencies. It is up to us to create answers, not to be vulnerable to answers that have been offered by 'expens'."

Banff Reflections Cont'd.

-We have to live with the consequences of our consciousness--our awakening. It is difficult. How do we bear the grief that our work forces us to face? It is through finding a way to not let our grief be paralyzing. We have to shape grief and make it work for us; turn it to righteous indignation, not one more woman, not one more child.

Shirley Turcotte

-Her talk on her own childhood torture was almost more than I could bear. Shirley and her sister were tortured by a Christian cult as children. Shirley starts plastic surgery May 31 on her legs to attempt to give them some appearance of being normal.

-She told of her hallucinations and flashbacks and finding ways to interpret them. "I know I'm not crazy. I'm just living two time zones at the same time. Flashbacks and hallucinations are simply old times visiting the present."

-She has learned to believe, support and love the person she is.

Kate Millett

-Kate reviewed her new book The Loony Bin Trip. She calls herself a "certified mad woman". She was locked up by family members 20 years ago and is a survivor of psychiatric oppression.

 One out of every five Americans is an American woman under the control of a psychiatrist. -Psychiatry sets itselfup as a "priesthood", an untouchable hierarchy of specialization in treatment.

-She asks us to make the exploration of the patient's rights movement a part of the feminist cause. There are enormous political ramifications involved in the psychiatrist-as-god attitude of society. Women are being managed and controlled by it. Psychiatry has eclipsed organized religion for controlling society and its criteria are legalized and enforceable....We support a system that relies ultimately on absolute force over absolute helplessness which is the pattern of violence inor society.

Rose Mary Brown

-She spoke about violence from a global perspective....Speaking from the perspective a Third World woman, she said forms of violence against women are focused on our sexuality having patriarchal foundations and demands. This can be generalized across any ethnic boundary in the world.

-The violence of racism is a form of violence from which there is no escape. It is like being female in a male dominated society. We should listen and respect the accusations that we are racist among ourselves. We should not put our guilt on a pedestal and workship it; rather, we need to analyze, accept, examine and change our actions. There can be no feminism where there is racism.

The Lethbridge office has already had its first "Take Back The Night" meeting please call the office to find out the date of the next meeting.


ASWAC REGIONAL REPRESENTATIVES
