

MISSION STATEMENT

The purpose of the Alberta Status of Women Action Committee is to advance the status of women in Alberta by providing a forum for women's voices, raising awareness and sharing resources to effect change.

OUR FEATURE

International Women's Day, March 8th, was chosen in remembrance of the 1857 strike when women textile workers in New York stopped work and marched in the streets to protest twelve hour work days, incredibly low salaries and child labour. At the time of the protest police reacted swiftly by brutalizing the women and trampling them with horses.

Over the years since 1857 many, demonstrations have taken place.

1900-1908: Montreal. During this period women textile workers led more than 40 strikes. In certain instances women were forced back to work under fear of retaliation by the army if they did not comply.

1908: Conditions had scarcely improved since 1857. Fiftyone years later, women textile workers still only earned \$6 for fifty-six hours of work per week. Seventy percent of the women leading the demonstration were between sixteen and twenty five years old.

1910: Copenhagen, Denmark. During the Second International Socialist Conference, Clara Zetkin (leader of the German Socialist Party), had the following motion adopted: "that March 8th be proclaimed International Women's Day." March 8th was celebrated for the first time in 1911 in remembrance of those brave women who led the 1857 strike in New York.

1934: Montreal. Women workers in the needle trade

successfully closed down one hundred and twenty five boutiques. Twelve strikers were arrested.

1935-1952: Quebec. Strikes by textile and garment industry workers occurred throughout most of Quebec. Many of these lasted for a long time and were marked by violence.

1974: Since this time, strikes have not only occurred in the textile industry but demands by women union members have spread to include such industries as pulp and paper mills, nursing, information, etc.

Since March 8th, 1979, regional celebrations and demonstrations organized by women and other organizations as well as unions have taken place in our province Many of the activities have extended beyond the day itself and last throughout the week of March 8th. With our current political situation in Alberta all women need to involve themselves as well as their family and friends to ensure our voices are heard by the Klein government. Everyone is invited to attend this year's activities and we ask that you write and/or call your M.L.A. to make sure he/she is representing your concerns.

Let's not forget our sisters and their struggles, deaths and courage! We celebrate our history by learning from our history!

Travel Subsidies

ASWAC Members in good standing are eligible to apply for subsidies in order to attend the AGM. Subsidy applications must be in writing and received in the Edmonton Office by April 23, 1993. When applying for a subsidy include your name, address, phone number, other members with whom you are car pooling and whether you require billeting. ASWAC will cover the following, for women who need financial assistance: Travel at .17 per km and Childcare at \$25.00/day. On-site Childcare will <u>not</u> be provided.

If you do not require financial assistance, but do require billeting or other special needs, please notify the ASWAC Edmonton office in writing by April 23.

<u>NAC Member groups in good standing</u> are eligible to apply for subsidies in order to send one representative delegate to attend the NAC Regional Meeting. **Subsidy applications must be in writing and received in the ASWAC Edmonton Office by April 23, 1993.** NAC will cover the following, for groups who need financial assistance: Travel at .17 per km and Childcare at \$25.00/day. On-site Childcare will <u>not</u> be provided.

ARTICLE FIVE - MANAGEMENT

SECTION .01

FROM: "There shall be a Board comprised of eleven to fifteen full members in good standing" TO: "There shall be a Board comprised of a maximum of fifteen full members in good standing"

ARTICLE EIGHT - MEETINGS

SECTION .02

- FROM: "A simple majority of members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at Annual General Meetings"
- TO: "A simple majority of members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at Annual General Meetings"

WRITE ON!



As feminists, it is important that we are politically active in whatever capacity we can be. While political activism takes on a variety of meanings for a variety of people, one method of activism in which many of us can participate is letter writing. Writing

letters to MLA's and MP's is a relatively effective way of lobbying on an individual basis.

In order to provide ASWAC's membership with information regarding issues warranting letters we have created this section for political information sharing. To this end, we encourage members to let us know of any other letter writing campaigns in which they are involved.

The Edmonton ASWAC office has a copy of MP's names and ridings, if you require this information please call the office. **Please send a copy of your letter to the Edmonton ASWAC office.**

Correspondence to federal Ministers should be addressed to the House of Commons, Ottawa, Ontario K1A 0A6, and is postage free. Please send a copy of your letter to the Edmonton ASWAC office.

Women and Minorities are on the chopping block again. Stats Canada studies have shown that social spending is not responsible for the debt. Yet, politicians have once again offered up a budget which includes substantial cuts to grants and contributions to organizations. Included are the Secretary of State Women's Program, Health & Welfare Family Violence Programs, and Anti-racism funding. Aboriginal and Multicultural funding have also taken severe cuts. Please write to Finance Minister Don Mazankowski and let him know that these cuts are not acceptable.

Rape has always been used as a weapon of war. It has been confirmed that at least 20,000 women have been confined in rape/death camps in the Bosnia area. There is evidence of rape of Somali women in refugee camps as a result of the conflict in their area. Women in Peru and elsewhere in the world have also been victims of the ongoing battles in their countries. Please write to External Affairs Minister Barbara McDougall to express your sentiments about human rights abuses against women and Canada's role in supporting every woman's' wish to live with dignity and have the opportunity to make a better life for their children.

Bill C-105 proposes detrimental changes to the Unemployment Insurance Act. Contact your M.P. to register your opposition to this bill, especially if you live in a Progressive Conservative riding.

The Legal Aid system in this a province is in jeopardy! Access has always been difficult as personnel is limited and delays in court appearances have always been lengthy. Legal Aid is not free and is becoming increasingly more expensive The ASWAC office gets calls from women daily who require immediate, affordable service from Legal Aid and are not able to access it for financial reasons or because timing would make their case moot. This is a particular problem for issues of wife assault, child custody issues and divorce. Write to the new Minister of Justice, Dick Fowler and to Premier Ralph Klein. Legal Aid is funded federally, but it administered provincially.

The Canadian Abortion Rights Action League (CARAL) works to ensure that no woman in Canada is denied access to safe, legal abortion CARAL is encouraging the testing of the RU486 pill for use in Canada. RU486 has been the subject of dozens of clinical studies conducted in over 20 countries and has proved effective in conjunction with prostaglandin as soon as a woman knows she is pregnant and wants an abortion. It is most important to write to our Members of Parliament to ask for it to be made available for testing in Canada. Also contact Hoechst-Roussel Canada Inc., the pharmaceutical company which has not pressed for clinical trials of RU486 in Canada: (4045 Cote Vertu, Montreal, PQ, H4R 2E8.)

Women's Issues and Human Rights in Alberta are currently in jeopardy due primarily to newly appointed cabinet ministers who are uninformed and insensitive to women and minority rights. If you have not yet received your letter writing kit from ASWAC, or if you need more to pass around at meetings or gatherings, contact either the Edmonton or Calgary office. They can be requested in volumes for insertion into local mail outs if desired.

This just in:

Newly appointed Minister for the Secretary of State, Monique Landry announced major cuts to the Women's Program She said that no group will be spared and that we should be happy with what we get. The program will be renewed, she assured us, but it will be cut back and may move to another ministry. For ASWAC, this is devastating! As it is, ASWAC spends increasing amounts of time (at the expense of ongoing projects) attempting to diversify our funding base. Although we have managed the federal funding shortfall up to this point with sporadic grants and fundraising projects, these sources too are drying up. Currently ASWAC faces regular staff lay offs, office closures, and service reduction. In recent discussions with the Minister's staff, ASWAC has learned that the letters MP's have received from Alberta to date have been extremely influencial to the program's continuance and if further letters were received in enough numbers, they could directly affect future funding to ASWAC. We can reverse the decision to cut women's programs, so pick up a pen and paper right now and write directly to Monique Landry, The Secretary of State of Canada, Ottawa, K1A 0M5 and state emphatically how important women's programs are to you!

ASWAC Takes on the System at the Ballot Box

It has become painfully clear that past gains women have made are in jeopardy. Because elected officials are increasingly showing their support for the ultra-conservative agenda, progressive change for women is threatened and we may even lose ground. Now is the time to speak out against the backlash and exercise our power.

ASWAC has determined that our priorities should lie in proaction. Since both the Federal and Provincial elections are looming, now is an opportune time to bring our issues to the forefront and design a new political agenda for this country based on fairness, equity and responsible government. In the past few months, the ASWAC offices have been flooded with phone calls from concerned and desperate individuals on issues ranging from proposed changes in Unemployment Insurance to general disgust about current provincial cabinet ministers. It is clear that people are angry and ready to act.

ASWAC has proudly launched a campaign designed to increase women's participation in the upcoming federal and provincial elections. This non-partisan project will encourage women to vote, educate themselves and their families on the issues, work in constituency organizations, and generally become more involved in main-stream politics. Political parties will benefit by the increase in memberships, campaign workers and votes that will result from the increased participation of women. Women will benefit because we will be able to exercise our power in numbers.

The recent election in the United States, although not entirely revolutionary, is an excellent example of what kind of change can occur through collective action. A concerted effort was made to attract women voters and as a result our neighbours to the south now have the largest percentage of elected women in the government and experienced the highest voter turn out in years. Just think of the difference we could make in Alberta alone! There are more women of voting age in Alberta than the total number of votes cast in the last provincial election.

The first priority for the Political Action Campaign will be to publish a poster for mass distribution encouraging women to vote. This publicity campaign reflects our belief that the more women know, the more they will understand the huge difference they can make in their own and in their families' lives. Two publications will also be created and distributed province-wide. The first will be a publication supplying women with basic issue information and questions to ask candidates. The second publication will include a more indepth analysis of the issues and more questions, instructions on how to organize an all candidates forum, and an outline of party policies based on the results of party responses to a questionnaire addressing issues of particular interest to women. The results of the questionnaire will also be made available to the media through news conferences held throughout the province. These news conferences will allow ASWAC an opportunity to again promote women s increased participation in the upcoming elections

In order for this campaign to become a reality, ASWAC members are encouraged to take leadership in their communities by helping to determine priority issues, by distributing the information, and most importantly, promoting the urgency of such action. A provincial committee based in Edmonton has been developing the initial work on the campaign and is drafting the publications. The committee has already been consulting with the Alberta women's community to prioritize issues, so look forward to being contacted for your input and please contact us if you have any concerns or questions.

Because of ASWAC's limited financial resources, we are soliciting donations to help defray the costs of this provincewide project. Donations will be used for the publication and distribution of the posters and resource materials. All donations will be acknowledged in the publications. We understand the financial situation in which most women and organizations find themselves, but feel that this campaign can benefit us all in the long run, so will be well worth it. Talk to your employers, your brothers, your partners, your fathers and your sons. It is an investment in their future too. Remember, part of the current political agenda is to silence women by decreasing our funding, delaying our funding and ultimately eliminating it. See the "Write On" section for immediate action.

Simply changing who holds the power is of course not the entire answer, but if our voices are loud enough, strong enough and persistent enough, we will be heard. We must give them no choice but to listen to the women of Alberta.

Women of the North

What do you imagine it would be like to lose your job? What goes through a person's mind when they are told that their position has been eliminated because of tough times? Thousands of people in Alberta, and hundreds in McMurray, are facing unemployment and under-employment as the lingering effects of the recession, or should we finally call it a depression, hits companies and governments across the province.

As my part-time job goes from poverty line to a 15% cut in hours, I too face the bleak job market in the hope that two part time jobs will keep creditors at bay. I am only one of eight part-time people who have had their hours cut as a result of the "powers that be," Fort McMurray City Council (who by the way, are the same dinosaurs who changed their name from councillors back to aldermen.)

How many others are there? Women make up the vast majority of people taking part time jobs with no security, no benefits, no future. No wonder when the statistics of men's versus women's pay come out, we had barely managed to crawl another few inches towards pay equity.

Why do we do it? Why do we take the jobs with twenty less hours per week? Because if we don't someone else will. As jobs get more scarce and unemployment rises, we compete with each other for the honour of working at all.

Even as I write these words, I can't help but think about women who don't have the luxury of <u>choosing</u> a part time job. Some women must work full time as the only wage earner in their family.

Single parents affected by the latest round of cuts must be frantic. In these tough times, under-employed women in bad relationships may be reluctant to leave the relative security of even an abusive house for the big, bad world. Assuming that my already part-time hours will be cut even further, does anyone know of a job for a creative, energetic, friendly, (if a little outspoken) woman? Hobbies and experience include president of a women's shelter, writing column for a local weekly paper and sewing. I would prefer full time after five years in Fort McMurray, but am willing to accept, like most women, a part time position with little or no benefits.

Sound just a little personal? Sometimes issues should come from the personal side too, instead of just the "management" side.

She suggested that groups should try partnership sharing, sensitizing their MPs and diversifying their funding. There was no understanding that we have all being doing this for years.

The recommendations from the group are: Focus on actions. Groups across the country are asked to visit their MPs in their constituencies protesting the cuts, doing protests in front of their regional Sec. State offices and bombarding the Minister's office in Ottawa with letters of protests.

You can decide when it is most appropriate for you to do these actions. Between 1st and 15th of March, women across the country are asked to send empty purses to the prime minister to protest the cuts. On 8th of March there will be a press conference in Ottawa with reps from five National Groups NAC, FNFCF, DAWN. NOIVMW and FFQ to protest the cuts to Women's Programs.

In our regions were are urged to do some form of protest in our area on this day.

I will be speaking at the Edmonton IWD event on this topic and will be promoting the empty purses campaign.

As a feminist, I am concerned with the rights of ALL womyn. As a result of this commitment, I have fought for womyn's rights that do not serve me personally. For example, the right to safe and easy access to contraception and abortion, making a career out of homemaking and childrearing, living free of racism, fully participating in the military, and becoming a Catholic priest/ess. Make people who support the Alberta Report aware of the lies that they tell about feminists, lesbians and gays. Phone the Homosexuals' Defense League to help them defend us against the Alberta Report. Write a letter to your MP, MLA and the Editor of your local paper and tell them that in 1993 it is NOT Okay to discriminate against a human being because of their sexual orientation. And last but not least come to the gay pride march in June - hold your head high and walk at my side.

Bill C-79. An Act to Amend the DIVORCE ACT and the FAMILY ORDERS AND MAINTENANCE ACT is currently being studied by a parliamentary committee. The bill seeks to make it easier to get child support from a noncustodial parent who lives in another province. Ontario, K1A 0A6. •Update - Bill C-79 has been passed by the House of Commons and now goes before the Senate for approval.

BREAST CANCER is the leading cause of death for women aged 35 to 54. The government has committed to \$20 million over 5 years for a BREAST CANCER RESEARCH CHALLENGE FUND, and the management committee of the fund is to include breast cancer survivors. \$4 million per year is an improvement over the \$894,000 allocated last year to a disease which claims the life of 5,000 women a year, to a disease in which responsible risk factors have yet to be identified. Breast Cancer Action designed the symbol of a pink ribbon with black lining to represent the thousands of women diagnosed each year and the memory of the thousands who die each year.
