The purpose of the Alberta Status of Women Action Committee is to advance the status of women in Alberta by providing a forum for women's voices, raising awareness and sharing resources to effect change.

OUR FEATURE

Political Action Campaign

The campaign is designed to help women prepare for the upcoming provincial and federal elections. The campaign will include encouraging women to vote, canvassing candidates and parties for their positions of particular interest to women, making their responses publicly available and supplying background information and questions on issues for women to ask candidates. This campaign will not endorse any particular candidates or parties; rather it seeks to help women to empower themselves through their informed participation in mainstream politics.

To date, questionnaires have been sent out to all three provincial parties, to inquire about their positions on various issues affecting women. The responses will be combined with background information into a publication. A second publication will address organizing and/or attending candidates meetings, and will include suggestions of what questions to ask and points of concern for Alberta women. The third component of this campaign is the Alberta Women's Lobby Day. This event is to be held May 17th at the Legislature Building. Time has been set aside for ASWAC member groups and Alberta NAC groups to meet with each party caucus for approximately 45 minutes. Due to space limitations, we request that each group send one or two representatives to attend this important meeting. The meeting will give us a face to face opportunity to question and hear from the politicians, as well as to be heard. A mail out to all ASWAC and Alberta NAC groups has been done; if you have not received yours, please call the Edmonton office.

Please ensure your group's membership is in good standing. All who will be attending the lobby day are asked to attend an organizing meeting on May 16th at A.U.P.E Building, 10451-170 Street.

We request that all ASWAC members phone and/or write their M.L.A. to ensure she/he attends the lobby day.

If you can offer ASWAC your time, energy, input, expertise or money to help carry out the political action campaign, please call either ASWAC office.

Breast Cancer is the leading cause of death for women aged 35 to 54. The government has committed to \$20 million over 5 years for a Breast Cancer Research Challenge Fund, and the management committee of the fund is to include breast cancer survivors. \$4 million per year is an improvement over the \$894,000 allocated last year to a disease which claims the life of 5,000 women a year, a disease in which responsible risk factors have yet to be identified. Breast Cancer Action designed the symbol of a pink ribbon with black lining to represent the thousands of women diagnosed each year and the memory of the thousands who die each year. Wmst 267: Perspectives on Women: an introduction

This course introduces women's studies and covers theories of human origins, women and work, gender identity, gender and communication, and women in popular culture.

Wmst 303 Issues in Women's Health

This course allows students to examine and apply a feminist analysis to health issues. The course seeks to explain why women have little control over their health care.

Wmst 400 Feminism in the Western Tradition

This course deals with feminist thought and feminist movements in the western tradition from the 1790's to the 1940's. Its topics include the meaning of feminism, and feminist attempts to change the social order in particular times and places.

Wmst 401 Contemporary Feminist Theory

This course focuses on the theoretical basis of programs, policies and research for and about women. It introduces students to feminist theory published in Canada and the U.S. in the last two decades.

Wmst 444 Feminist Research Methodology

This course is about feminist epistemology, feminist research methodology, and feminist research methods. Students will learn about the differences between feminist and sexist research, in various disciplines. A small research project is required.

Soc 312 Women and Work

This course will introduce current controversies surrounding the most appropriate ways of conceptualizing and understanding women's experience of work in the home and the labour force. A major objective of the course will be the development of skills in critical analysis.

Psych 343 Issues and Strategies in Counselling Girls and Women

Students compare and evaluate traditional and alternative approaches to therapy for girls and women, study the nature of psychological distress commonly experienced by girls and women, and examine strategies for coping with it.

WRITE ON!



As feminists, it is important that we are politically active in whatever capacity we can be. While political activism takes on a variety of meanings for a variety of people, one method of activism in which many of us can participate is letter writing. Writing

letters to MLA's and MP's is an extremely effective way of lobbying on an individual basis. Letters from individuals carry more weight than letters signed on behalf of a group. In order to provide ASWAC's membership with information regarding issues warranting letters, we have created this section for political information sharing. To this end, we encourage members to let us know of any other letter writing campaigns in which they are involved. The Edmonton ASWAC office has a copy of MP's names and ridings; if you require this information, please call the office. Correspondence to federal Ministers should be addressed to the House of Commons, Ottawa, Ontario K1A 0A6 and is postage free. Please send a copy of your letter to the Edmonton ASWAC office.

Rape has always been used as a weapon of war. It has been confirmed that at least 20,000 women have been confined in rape/death camps in the Bosnia area. There is evidence of rape of Somali women in refugee camps as a result of the conflict in their area. Women in Peru and elsewhere in the world have also been victims of the ongoing battles in their countries. Please write to External Affairs Minister Barbara McDougall to express your sentiments about human rights abuses against women and Canada's role in supporting every woman's wish to live with dignity and have the opportunity to make a better life for her children.

The Canadian Abortion Rights Action League (CARAL) works to ensure that no woman in Canada is denied access to safe, legal abortion. At present, CARAL is encouraging the testing of the RU486 pill for use in Canada. RU486 has been the subject of dozens of clinical studies conducted in over 20 countries and has proved effective in conjunction with prostaglandin as soon as a woman knows she is pregnant and wants an abortion. It is most important to write to our Members of Parliament to ask for it to be made available for testing in Canada. Also contact Hoechst-Roussel Canada Inc., the pharmaceutical company which has not pressed for clinical trials of RU486 in Canada; their address is 4045 Cote Vertu, Montreal, PQ, H4R 2E8.

Women's issues, human rights and immigrants rights in Alberta are currently in jeopardy due primarily to newly appointed cabinet ministers who are uninformed and insensitive to these issues. If you have not yet received your letter writing kit from ASWAC. or if you need more to pass around at meetings or gatherings, contact either the Edmonton or Calgary office. Multiple copies can be requested for insertion into local mail outs if desired. Please write your M.L.A. today!

The Caravan will have passed through Alberta by the time you get this and many of your messages will have gone with the giant banner.


I don't want to take anyone away from the ASWAC/NAC activities on that weekend but if you cannot come to Edmonton please attend the activities in your area.
