Our Feature

The History of the Regional Representatives

In the last issue of the ASWAC newsletter our feature was dedicated to the regional representatives. Due to the length of that article we were unable to include the history. This article was written by G. Bailey.

It was a cold and snowy Sunday, we were all tired and anxious to beat the storm home after a very busy and exciting 1985 Annual General Meeting (AGM). Suddenly the day brightened and we all perked up. Janet Beebee introduced the idea of Regional Representatives, for each of 7 provincial areas. They would represent ASWAC across the province: meeting with present members, contacting prospective members and, in general propagating feminist issues in anyway possible. The idea met with enthusiastic consenus but there was a shortage of available bodies. Janet Beebee and Joan Whitecalf of Camrose and Gerry Bailey of Westerose (Pigeon Lake) volunteered. The latter immediately took off for the sun and sand of southeast Asia (where she'll be by the time your reading this; it's an annual event). Little did we realize that we were taking on redneck rural Alberta, peppered with the new right.

But we tried. Our first joint meeting was in McDonalds in Wetaskiwin. We commiserated with each other - weeping and wailing, and then cheered up like good ASWAC members and charged forth again. Janet and Joan had a film night featuring a pro-choice film - that took courage have you seen the large anti-choice billboard on the road into Camrose? Gerry phoned all ASWAC members between Edmonton and Calgary and met with Red Deer Status of Women. Later, Lori Crocker of Innisfail came aboard and organized the Isolation Brunches which are still running.

It is not possible to list all the regional representatives and all the great things they have done or at least attempted. Some moved from the Board to regional repping; some moved to the Board. We have had at times, members from Medicine Hat, Lethbridge, Calgary, Innisfail, Camrose, Fort McMurray, Grimshaw, Two Hills and probably other places. We attempt to meet several times a year and attend Board meetings. Joan Whitecalf took on the herculean task of organizing an AGM in Camrose. It was most successful and generated a great number of letters to the editors about the "disgusting" topics. One such topic was chaired by Mary Burlie with a group of women who described their lives under our welfare system. I still weep when I recall their stories. That workshop led to the Women Against

Poverty Campaign.

Regional Representatives are very independent but cooperative feminists and YOU CAN JOIN US ANY-TIME. We pass on suggestions and criticisms to the Board and offer help for such things as the Women Against Poverty campaign. We have irregular meetings to help each other and make us feel as though we are important and useful, which we are.

Since our last issue we have three new Regional Representatives we would like to welcome. They are: Ruth Bergeron from Innisfail; Sharlene Lundquist from Jasper; Liz Wetheral from Ponoka. These women join our current Regional Representatives and we all look forward to working together.

Take Back The Night `93

The slogan *Take Back The Night* was first used in the United States as a theme for a national protest march down San Franciso's pornography strip. The march took place at night and was in the same spirit as many similar events taking place all over the world. *Take Back The Night* is a profound symbolic statement of our commitment to stopping the tide of violence against women in all arenas. It is our demand that perpetrators of such violence; from rapists to batterers to pornographers to imagemakers in the mass media, be held responsible for their actions, and made to change.

That we have been unable to walk the streets after dark without a male to protect us from violence, has been assumed in this society for so long that people can hardly imagine a culture in which this would not be the case. We welcome support from men, who can offer transportation, child care and understanding that men have the right and responsibility to assist women in this society to create a safe community for everyone.

Women dare to imagine a future where yourselves, your children and your loved ones would exist free from violence within or outside the home. Come to Take Back The Night in your community and show your support. Check the calendar of events for the details of the march/ rally in your area.

Write On !

As feminists, it is important that we are politically active in whatever capacity we can. While political activism takes on a variety of meanings for a variety of people, one method of activism in which many of us can participate is letter writing. Writing letters to M.L.A.s and M.P.s is an extremely effective way of lobbying on an individual basis. Letters from individuals carry more weight than letters signed on behalf of a group. In order to provide ASWAC's membership with information regarding issues warranting letters, we have created this section for political information sharing. To this end, we encourage members to let us know of letter writing campaigns in which they are involved. **Please send a copy of your letter to the Edmonton ASWAC office.**

•The Provincial Government's strategy to eliminate the debt is not working! The measures being taken by the newly elected Klein government are at the expense of women, mostly women working for low wages and women on social assistance and women students. Don't let them fool you. The recent cuts to welfare, health care and social services will be devastating to the economy. Health care cuts mean more women will be out of work and fewer families will be able to afford proper treatment. Cuts to social services and welfare mean more women and children will be on the streets. Write and call your M.L.A., the Premier, the media and the official Opposition today. ASWAC will provide addresses, postage and supplies to those in need.

•Homeworkers are women garment workers working out of their homes for large garment manufacturers. Several department stores sell these garments as a way to make more money because of the low wages. Write to Mr. George J. Kosich, President, Hudson Bay Co., 401 Bay Street, Toronto, Ont., M5H 2Y4. Demand that the corporate strategy be changed so that they buy from garment manufacturers who agree to ensure that all workers are paid fair wages, work in decent conditions and who comply, at a minimum, with the standards as set out in the Employment Standards Act. Ask Mr. Kosich to write to you with his strategy to end the exploitation of homeworkers.

•Sick of receiving junk mail? Write to the Direct Marketing Association, 607-#1 Concord Gate, Don Mills, Ont. M3C 3N6, and ask that your name be removed from any mail lists and ask them to not provide your name and address to anyone in the future. Also, ask that they notify all those to whom they have sold, given, or otherwise. released your name, that you do not wish to receive their junk mail. Thank them for respecting your request, and right to choose. Pick up a NO JUNK MAIL sticker for your mail box at Earth's General Store (Whyte Ave, Edmonton).

News From NAC

AGM

The AGM committee met and did a careful review of the evaluation forms from the AGM and we provided our impressions. There were a number of issues raised for improvement. The most frequent request was for more breaks and time for socializing and networking.

Rachel Gillooly has been retained, starting Sept. 1 to begin organizing for next year. This should result in more funding, fewer problems and more and earlier information to the membership. Rachel also has the evaluations from this year and will use them in the planning. An updated list of NAC publications and resolutions passed at the AGM should be with member groups now. If non-member groups and others would like this information, please let me know.

Outreach

Following the AGM, NAC released the Review of the Situation of Women in Canada, responded to both the federal report on sexism in the justice system and the Canadian Panel on Violence Against Women report. Member groups should have the Review by now, others may order it from the NAC national Office.

My file of Alberta women's groups is growing and I will provide information on NAC as well as materials on the election and other activities to as many women in Alberta as possible. If yours is not a NAC member group or you know of groups that should belong, I would appreciate hearing from you.

NAC is working hard to become independent of government funding but we must continue to increase our membership and donations to sustain this effort.

I would urge you to join the NAC Action Fund and become a Friend of NAC. I have information and applications for this, as well as group applications.

Election

The slogan for the NAC election campaign will be "Equality is the Bottom Line." This is to send the message that we can afford equality. Member groups can expect an election package in the next few weeks. Included will be a summary of the Review of the Situation of Women. And while the AGM decided that NAC will remain nonpartisan, this document clearly demonstrates the impact of the neo-conservative agenda on the lives of women in Canada.

Sunera Thobani will be in Calgary September 26 and 27 and in Edmonton October 22 and 23. This is dependent on when the election is called. Watch for details.




Lunch at the Legislative Buildings


