## **Our Feature**

### The Deadly Silence

(a comment and confession by Sharon Reiner

December 6 approaches again. We will attend official memorials. We will read articles about violence, gun control, and mass murders. We will all bow our heads in sadness and grief for the 14 women gunned down in Montreal four years ago. We will remember how we felt that day as we mourn the lives lost. But will we remember that we are still in the middle of a war? Because the misogyny war rages on and the silence about feminist action against it is deafening.

We claim victory for finally convincing the public that the Montreal Massacre was not an isolated act of a madman, but rather another act of violence against women perpetrated by men every six minutes or so in this country. What everyone has not yet noticed, however is that violence against women is part of everyday society and part of a much larger picture. December 6 has ironically given people a way to isolate violence (and really violent violence at that) as the issue, and not misogyny. Since 1989, violence against women has become the issue of the day for governments and they now no longer treat it as "just a feminist issue" and proudly proclaim a "zero tolerance" policy, yet almost every aspect of popular culture implicitly encour-

ages it.

The backlash against feminism and the rise of the neoconservative agenda has forced this country into a deep silence around the real solutions to stopping violence against women. The cries of feminists are being drowned out by the loud opposition to violence against women as an isolated sick act unconnected to inequality, oppression and misogyny. It's a clever political ploy on their part, because feminists are compelled to support increased awareness about violence, but on the other hand addressing the issue of violence without attention to the root cause will never eliminate it. By never eliminating it, women will continue to live in fear forever. A man once suggested to me that December 6 should have the same international recognition as November 11 in honour of those killed. It made sense to me at the time, but somehow it didn't feel right because on December 6 I don't mourn soldiers and celebrate peace. I mourn past, present and future innocent victims, of a war which is still in full swing, and one which most victims do not even realize is happening. This, to me demonstrates how dangerous the silence really is, and how all women are potentially victims whether they are in an engineering class, or at home, or in a car on a date.

None of this is, of course, new to anyone and I don't mean to insult anyone's intelligence, minimize the efforts of feminists who have been making these points forever, nor to minimize the lives of the women who were killed on December 6, but I know for myself, having been tempted (because it seemed safer), to downplay feminism in my life, that that is the most dangerous thing I could ever do.

The following is by Nicole Lacelle from "The Political is Personal" found in *The Montreal Massacre*, a collection of letters and articles written shortly after December 6, 1989:

"The first thing I felt upon hearing the news about the massacre was that this was a case of mistaken identity. Why them and not me? Why not us, those of us who've

been feminists for twenty years? We were fully conscious of the hatred our actions provoked and the dangers which often threatened us. Why take it out on young women who would never have imagined there could be negative implications of what they were doing? They innocently inherited the career openings we feminists created for women. Why take it out on them, on those "civilians," and not us "militants"? Simply because they followed in our footsteps? They were so far behind that they'd lost sight of us. For them it was all very simple, they wanted to become engineers, that's all. It was there for them, available as long as they came up with the academic record normally required. For us it was different, we were on enemy territory, shells exploding around us from all directions; it didn't take much to figure out there was a war going on. These young women ended up standing in No Man's Land; it was only too easy to ignore that the peace treaty had never been signed."

## Women's Health

The Women and AIDS Project is co-sponsored by the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters, Edmonton Women's Shelters and the Edmonton Board of Health. The project is based in Edmonton, housed at the Board of Health and works with women province wide - particularly through the sheltering movement.

The threat of HIV infection is of particular concern for women. Women, and young women in particular, are the fastest growing group worldwide that are becoming infected with this virus. The prevailing notion that HIV/ AIDS is still seen as a gay man's disease is a hard fact. Most educational prevention strategies are based on the fact that women have sufficient power in their intimate sexual relations to negotiate safer sex practices. This assumption is not rooted in the reality of many women's experiences. In addition to this, the educational strategies aimed at the general public always portray female sexuality in a heterosexual context. Women who have sex with women are a group which is construed to have no risk of contracting HIV through their lovemaking. This myth continues because of a continued habit of looking at "risk groups" instead of "risk behaviors". Women who have sex with women may have or have had unprotected sex with men and may have shared needles during injection drug use. No group of people is without risk if risk behaviors are engaged in. The traditional prevention strategies are not seen as practical by many women, and therefore these women are left without any information about prevention strategies that will work for them in their social context.

A goal of the Women and AIDS Project is to bring current and relevant information about the medical and social issues for women and HIV/AIDS to other women in Alberta. For more information about the Project and its resources, call Ione Challborn, Project Facilitator, at 482-9844.

So are we, the Alberta Association of Registered Nurses. We have submitted our proposal for health care reform -Increasing Direct Access to Nursing Services. We believe that the health care consumer - the taxpayer has a right to access the health care professional of their choice rather than always having to go to the doctor, or emergency room for care. Registered Nurses are competent professional care givers and we can provide NURSING services cost effectively to reduce cost to the system, and the taxpayer. Unfortunately, the government isn't listening and the waste continues, while front line care givers are being laid off. We believe that health care reform is necessary, however we wish the government had a plan, rather than blinding cutting. We believe Direct Access to Nursing Services is such a plan. While political activism takes on a variety of meanings for a variety of people, one method of activism in which many of us can participate is letter writing. Writing letters to M.L.A.s and M.P.s is an extremely effective way of lobbying on an individual basis. Letters from individuals carry more weight than letters signed on behalf of a group. In order to provide ASWAC's membership with information regarding issues warranting letters, we have created this section for political information sharing. To this end, we encourage members to let us know of letter writing campaigns in which they are involved. Please send a copy of your letter to the Edmonton ASWAC office.

 Cuts, cuts, cuts. This time it's education, 365 million, which translates into 565 million over 3 years taking into account inflation and increase in student numbers. Please write to Jim Dinning, Provincial Treasurer and Halvar Jonson, Minister of Education and Ralph "he cares he listens" Klein. We demand that this government respond. Write demanding no cuts are made to education and debunk some myths that have been presented; myth 1spending on education is out of control. Fact 1-Alberta's education spending is the lowest in Canada. Myth 2-Alberta has always spent more per capita on education than any other province. Fact 2-In 1991, Alberta ranked fifth in spending per capita on education. Myth 3-Albertans spend a high proportion of their income on education. Fact 3-Albertans, along with Nova Scotians, spend the lowest percentage of their personal income on education in Canada. Myth 4-Teachers' salaries constitute between 75 and 80 percent of school jurisdictions' budgets. Fact 4-The average cost of certificated teachers' salaries and insurance benefits to school jurisdictions is 53.5 percent. These figures are taken from material complied by the Edmonton teachers' locals. If you would like copies call Edmonton Public Teachers at 455-2164. Update--most recently teachers salaries are now being criticized. The Alberta Tax Payers Association claims teachers are paid too much. Again our society undervalues the work that is most important to our future, our kids. Cuts of any kind are unacceptable. Money can be saved by trimming down a top heavy government and all the excess they enjoy. Our politicians can set examples for the rest of

the province and take a pay cut and benefits cuts today. Write today, write often!

•There is a great deal of pressure on the provincial government to do away with the Alberta Advisory Council on Women's Issues (AACWI), the Alberta Secretariat, and the Human Rights Commission. The government says it is not hearing any support for these departments. The continued existence of these bodies is VITAL to women's and human rights in our province. Please visit your M.L.A., write Premier Klein and Community Development Minister Gary Mar to voice support.

Saving the Human Rights Commission - Can it be done?

Public opinion is being sought as part of the review of the Alberta Human Rights Commission. You are encouraged, either as an individual or as a group to submit something in writing to the review panel on how you think the commission can be strengthened and why you think a Human Rights Commission is necessary in this province. Rumors have abounded in the past few months about dismantling the commission and apparently numerous submissions have already been made to the government which echo this view. Submissions, letters, and opinions are being received until the end of January, so if you feel that the Human Rights Commission is necessary and that the Individual Rights Protection Act (the provincial legislation which governs the commission) should be expanded and maintained, please send in your comments today!

Some of the issues you may want to address....

- expanding the IRPA to include sexual orientation and source of income as a prohibited grounds of discrimination
- 2) making the commission an autonomous body which reports directly to the government instead of to a Minister
- 3) making the commission take on a stronger role in human rights advocacy and education
- 4) changing the IRPA to include systemic discrimination
- 5) ensuring that the commission and its process are accessible to all Albertans

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## **News From NAC**

### With excerpts from ACTION NOW!

"NAC's Election campaign was a huge effort made possible by thousands of volunteer hours and a substantial portion of NAC's annual budget."

In Alberta, I attempted to distribute NAC information, as widely as possible. I attended 5 planning meetings, 12 forums, supplied literature for an additional 8 forums as well as to a number of organizations and individuals. I traveled 223 kms, spent approximately 50 hours and managed to distribute about 1500 pieces of NAC literature. I didn't feel it was enough and when I saw the election results I felt that perhaps it hadn't been the right kind of information.

"Of serious concern... is the election of candidates from the Reform Party in Alberta and B.C. Having run on an openly racist and sexist platform, Reform candidates will undoubtedly try to shift political priorities further to the right."

"Continue to make anti-racist work an integral part of your organization's work. Work with other women's groups to counter the influence of the Reform Party. Monitor Reform Party events in your area and continue to expose its sexism and racism."

In my travels and efforts, I also distributed the ASWAC Political Action leaflets and sold NAC Voters' Guides. I worked with other Albertans to plan two protest rallies against our provincial government.

"We now need to rest, take stock - and set out with renewed energy and resources to insure that the issues of women's health, women's work, childcare and violence are understood and addressed by our new government."

"The election of a Liberal majority has stemmed the rightwing agenda of the Conservatives for the immediate future. But while the Liberal Party has shown more willingness than the Tories to address women's issues, NAC and other equality seeking organizations will have a key role to play in ensuring equality rights are not put on the back burner."

"Set up a meeting with your local Liberal MP in collaboration with other NAC member groups to discuss immediate fulfillment of election promises. Make sure they know what women in your area are

#### concerned about!"

NAC Voters' Guides are still available from ASWAC, or me, and are a good source of NAC policy.

### One Step Forward, Two Steps Back

ASWAC's Political Action Campaign (both provincially and federally) was strongly embraced by many volunteers and active ASWAC members across the province from the first annual provincial lobby day to the poster/brochure campaign for the federal election. Despite the limited resources available and the setbacks encountered, the campaign was a success in that ASWAC's membership increased and awareness was raised.

Unfortunately women's issues and social issues did not draw much public attention in either election, but it was not for lack of trying. Now that the federal election is over, and the provincial government is clear about where they stand on women's issues, let's keep up the pace and not let the government forget about half the population. The election material produced both by ASWAC and by NAC are still available through the provincial offices, and even though they were primarily designed to coincide with the elections, the material is still very relevant and timely. Members are encouraged to use the NAC Voter's Guide and the Political Action material as discussion and lobbying tools. As individual ASWAC members and as an organization, our work is clearly cut out for us.

The Political Action Campaign drained much of ASWAC's financial resources and now future projects are in serious jeopardy. Donations of any amount are encouraged in order to fund the ongoing struggle of promoting the status of women in Alberta.
