ASWAC Events

Even though the elections are long past, ASWAC's Political Action Campaign is still in high gear. Five representatives from ASWAC met with Community Development Minister Gary Mar and Alberta Women's Secretariat Executive Director Marie Riddle on February 8th.


The last time ASWAC met with a provincial Minister Responsible for Women's Issues, we had to deal with anti-feminist, racist, homophobic, and illogical attitudes of Dianne Mirosh. Mr. Mar, however, demonstrated a basic knowledge of women's issues and a willingness to listen to concerns raised by ASWAC members.

ASWAC representatives talked about how cuts to social assistance, health care and education were having a devastating affect on women, particularly on poor women. We explained our expectations of the Minister and encouraged Mr. Mar to voice our concerns at the cabinet table.

There were also discussions about the Alberta Advisory Council on Women's Issues, the Alberta Women's Secretariat and the Alberta Human Rights Commission. Mr. Mar said appointments to AACWI would be made "before June," and the Human Rights Commission review report would be made public "some time in May."

ASWAC has also been participating in the review of the Human Rights Commission and has helped to coordinate information-sharing between other equality-seeking groups in Calgary, Edmonton and Fort McMurray. Board Member Laurie Anderson made a presentation on behalf of ASWAC to the Review Committee in Calgary on February 19th. ASWAC is also scheduled to make another presentation in Edmonton on March 2nd.

The Political Action Committee encourages you to meet and discuss these and other issues with your MLAs. ASWAC is here to help you prepare for these meetings, or help you gather the information you need to write a letter. ASWAC's recommendations to the Human Rights Commission and minutes of the meeting with the Minister are available through the ASWAC Edmonton office.



CALL FOR NOMINATIONS ASWAC is seeking dedicated feminists to sit on the 1994-95 Board either as full Board Members, position-share Board Members or as Regional Representatives. If you or someone you know is an ASWAC member in good standing, has had some experience with women's issues, lobbying, volunteer groups, collective groups, or other equivalent background, and is interested in working together with other women to further the ASWAC goals, please submit a letter of interest, along with a short biography to the ASWAC Nominations Committee by April 15th, c/o ASWAC Edmonton Office. The committee will look at all nominations and follow all nominations procedures. At the Annual General Meeting (MAY 7), the ASWAC membership will select the Board and Regional Representatives. The Membership decides the make-up of the ASWAC Board, so it is important that all ASWAC members in good standing attend the Annual General Meeting to participate in the selection process.

TRAVEL SUBSIDIES ASWAC Members in good standing are eligible to apply for subsidies in order to attend the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Subsidy applications must be in writing and received in the Edmonton office by <u>April 22, 1994</u>. When applying for a subsidy, include your name, address, phone number, other members with whom you are car pooling and whether you require billeting. ASWAC will cover the following for women who need it: Travel at .17 cents per km and child care at \$25 per day (see childcare section). If you do not require financial assistance, but do require billeting or other special needs, please notify the ASWAC Edmonton office in writing by April 22, 1994.

CHILDCARE - On-site childcare will be available <u>depending on need</u>. You must phone Moyra by <u>April 15th</u> at 421-0306. If there is not a demand for on-site we will provide \$25 per day for you to find your own childcare. Please note the deadline date as we cannot make arrangements after this time.

A Time To Celebrate

March 8th, International Women's Day, has been a proud day of celebration for women around the world since 1910.

You can help to continue this tradition by joining in the celebration this year.

Women have a strong and proud heritage - one that is too often forgotten or not acknowledged. Women have always worked. Women have always made history, individually and together.

Among the many strengths of women is the ability to work together to achieve common goals. Women of all ages, social classes and political beliefs have worked together to reclaim the right to vote, to secure equality of treatment under the law, to improve labour laws and conditions for all people, and to promote equality of opportunity and remuneration.

Yes, we've come a long way. Yes, we still have far to go.

A Day To Remember

March 8, 1857

Women textile workers of New York's Lower East Side had had enough - of long hours, low pay, and intolerable work conditions for themselves and their children. Dropping their work, thousands filled New York streets that day with one voice of protest. In a massive demonstration, they bravely withstood brutal police retaliation to voice their demand for reasonable pay and labour laws, and the long-denied right of women to vote.

Copenhagen, 1910

March 8th is declared a holiday - International Women's Day - to commemorate the protest of 1857. The courage and tenacity of the women of 1857 have inspired thousands of women and men around the world to rise up and demand their rights. The declaration comes from congress of the Second International, at the urging of socialist leader Clara Zetkin. It acknowledges women's struggles and the inequalities against which women still must fight.

March 8th has been celebrated around the world since then, as a day of protest and of triumph for women.

"Bread And Roses"

Echoing the familiar revolutionary cry for "bread and freedom," women in the massive and bitter 1912 strike of woolen mill workers in Lawrence, Massachusetts, carried signs declaring "We want bread and roses too." Their slogan captured the spirit of women's struggles so well that it has become a popular and fitting symbol for International Women's Day to this day.

Alberta Women Celebrate

Since 1977, Alberta women in communities around the province have joined enthusiastically in celebrating International Women's Day. Groups such as the Edmonton Women's Coalition, the Alberta Status of Women Action Committee, Calgary's IWD Coalition, Calgary Status of Women, and ad hoc committees through out the province have organized many exciting activities on or near March 8th every year.

Canada And The World

From coast to coast, Canadian women celebrate International Women's Day.

Inspired by a revived interest in IWD after the United Nations' declaration of 1975 as International Women's Year, women in Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver, Winnipeg, Halifax, and Regina, as well as in Alberta and in many other Canadian towns and cities, have celebrated IWD for the past several years.

The United States, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, Denmark... and many more. All have taken part in IWD celebrations.

News From NAC

NAC Regional Meeting - Calgary, February 13, 1994

About 35 women from Alberta NAC groups turned out to hear NAC President, Sunera Thobani, and to discuss the evolution of NAC in the Alberta region.

Sunera had spoken at the conference of the Alberta Federation of Labour (AFL) Women's Committee earlier in the day.

Sunera shared some disheartening realities with us about NAC's financial state. We lost at least \$50,000 on the NAC Annual General Meeting in Saskatoon last year. While we westerners were eestatic to be able to send more than one delegate by car to the AGM, and were happy that our NAC sisters agreed that NAC must focus more on the regions outside Ontario, the financial shortfall is unfortunate. Due to the loss, one issue of Feminist Action has been cut; one full-time staff person has been laid off, so NAC now has six full-time staff; and the NAC executive is considering closing one of the two offices. New funding may be on the rise with the recent hiring of a fundraiser who works on commission. In light of the situation, Sunera encouraged us to include fundraising in our regional development efforts.

The drastic cuts that the Alberta government is making to social programs has captured the attention of the rest of Canada. The federal government has not announced whether they'll implement the %5 funding cuts planned by the old Tory government or freeze funding at current levels. NAC's priority for 1994-95 is social programs. A NAC working committee in Toronto is currently developing a review of social policy for our 1994 AGM. Merrill Copper (w:234-9297) of Calgary's Women Looking Forward volunteered to coordinate any input from Alberta NAC members.

Since Dorothy's two-year term as our regional rep. is nearly finished, those of us at the meeting agreed we must find an alternative to one individual trying to do most of NAC's work in our region. It was decided to set up a provincial steering committee who will be jointly responsible for representing NAC in Alberta. The new NAC rep. from our region with still be the one who attends the NAC executive meetings and the steering committee would help implement the work in our region. Contact Anne McGrath (w:269-3755) by **April 1** if you are interested in meeting to define and establish the Alberta NAC steering committee.

Yvonne Stanford, former rep. will be mailing out a call for nominations and these will be accepted until **March 31**. The deadline for ballots for the election will be **April 30**. Watch for this mail out. Your group must be a

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NAC member in good standing to nominate candidates. It's time to start thinking about resolutions your

NAC member group may want to put forward at the 1994 AGM. The deadline for constitutional amendments is March 12, while regular resolutions are due April 11.

We need all ASWAC members to write to Jean Chretien, Prime Minister of Canada (fax 613-941-6900), Michele Duprey, Minister of Canadian Heritage (fax 819-994-5987) & Sheila Finestone, Sceretary of State for the Status of Women (fax 819-953-8055) at House of Commons, Parliament Building, Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0A6. No postage is required.

•ask that the new government re-instate the 1 million dollars cut from this year's budget, with a view to immediately committing to a plan to restoring the Women's Program funding to at least the level it was in 1986.

 ask that the new government rescind all of the planned cuts to the Women's Program scheduled for the years to come.

 ask that the government improve the process for application, approval and disbursement of monies so that no further pressure is placed on an already tenuous funding situation.

•ask that the new government establish the Women's Program within the newly created Secretary of State ministry responsible for Women's Issues, within the Canadian Heritage portfolio (from the Human Resources and Labour portfolio), And to make similar changes for the Disabled Persons Participation Program.

Remember to send a copy of your letter to ASWAC.

Write to MLA Gary Mar, Minister of Community Development, and to Ralph Klein to express your support for the Alberta Advisory Council on Women's Issues and the Alberta Human Rights Commission. There is a great deal of support to cut both of these programs. We have underestimated the right wing attack against such equityseeking organizations. If 100 women wrote, they would listen; if 500 women wrote, they would have to act. Please write your letter today. If you need further information, call either ASWAC office.


