Happy Mother's Day, Celine Leonard by Christine Leonard

My Mum is the woman I most respect and admire on the world. She has faced her pain and her challenges with strength. I felt safe with her as a child; she was comforting and nurturing and was there for me. Raising 3 daughters as a single parent, she made sure that we had special times and gifts in our lives. Having "breakfast in bed" - her bed - on weekends, listening to her read books aloud.

Mum raised me to be a strong woman - sure of myself and proud of my accomplishments. I grew up taking my mother for granted. I never really appreciated what she was capable of until I had my own child and saw what it takes. She raised me to not be afraid of the world, not to deny myself opportunities or activities out of fear. She gave me encouragement to push for more and to push the boundaries of what I believed I could do.

She listened to me - to all my pain and anger growing up in a girl's body. When I told her in grade 7 that the boys were taunting me about my breasts saying, "jello always jiggles," she told me to tell them that "weiners always wobble." It worked! She taught me how to take my power back.

She didn't talk of feminism, but she lived it every day. She talked to us about being able to take care of ourselves as women. She was a stay at home mum until her divorce, when she suddenly had to go find a way to support herself and her children. Without much support from my father, she found money to take us camping, get us dance lessons and send us to camp. She made us Easter and Christmas outfit's each year which I treasured. She left love notes in our lunches and hidden among our clothes when we went away. She gave us the gift of many traditions such as Christmas ornaments about which we wrote stories. I love to go back now and read the stories that I wrote about these ornaments when I was 6 or 7.

As a teenager, she was a mother that I could talk to without fear of judgment or punishment. I could talk to her about what was happening in my body, how boys were tormenting me, which boy I was passionately in love with that week, my frustrations with teachers. She was always willing to listen to reason if I felt that she was being arbitrary or unfair. We could discuss our respective positions on the issue and would come to a resolution.

As a grown woman with my own daughter now, our relationship has moved to an even deeper level. I now understand the intensity of mother love. My mum's support and encouragement throughout my pregnancy and her loving presence at Julie's birth meant everything to me. What a wonderful gift that my daughter will know the love of an amazing women, my mother, Celine Leonard.

I now have an awareness that I didn't know everything at age seventeen and my mom allowed me the freedom at that age to discover that I didn't, although I was convinced I did. I see the endurance, patience and wisdom she demonstrated as I hurt her, sometimes unaware, while other times in retaliation. Mom had the ability to lead me yet still allow me to choose for myself.

We spend the first years of motherhood bonding with our children, then we spend the rest of their lives separating from them: sending them to school, watching them make social choices, and finally they leave home. My mom allowed me freedom in all of these choices and it is only now I can understand the pain a mother feels as she must let go. I love you mom and I love how you handled my growing up, you have helped me be who I am today, as well as who I will become.

The one thing I want my mom to know is how wonderful she made not only my childhood but being an adult as well. I honour you mom and wish you peace and happiness as we grow older. I'm thankful my kids will know you and learn from you. I love you. Happy Mother's Day!

# Sources & Resources

Edmonton Working Women's report on Sexual Harassment is a must-read for working women in Alberta. The report pinpoints the problems women have in laying sexual harassment complaints and provides recommendations to improve the procedures and policies of complaint-processing bodies. Additional material available includes: a manual for victims/survivors of sexual harassment and advocates for women who have been sexually harassed, a fact sheet on sexual harassment and a background information sheet on Edmonton Working Women.

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## Write On

Help save the Women's Program - Tell the Liberals "No More Cuts."

Women's Program, Canadian Advisory Council On The Status Of Women and Status of Women Canada have been amalgamated. This move is said to save \$1 million. The government has continued to be unclear about future funding for the Women's Program, which supports numerous women's groups including Alberta Status of Women Action Committee, Edmonton Working Women, Calgary Immigrant Women's Centre and many more throughout the province.

Even though Status of Women Minister Sheila Finestone said "Fiscal restraint must never be used as an excuse to roll back the advances that women have made in the past 20 years," this is exactly what the Liberals did with the federal budget. The Canadian Advisory Council on the Status of Women and the Women's Program of Human Resources Development have been rolled up into Status of Women Canada. Basically, CACSW ceased existing as of April 1, and with it goes the important role it played in researching and outlining, for government and women, how government policies and practices impact on women. Again, women's voices are silenced. Please take the time to write and fax Sheila Finestone and the Prime Minister to let them know you are extremely unhappy with these moves and that you want full funding (100%) for the Women's Program to continue.

Apparently no one is calling Health Minister Shirley McClellan with their concerns about a two-tier health care system. Please change this by giving her a call at 427-3665. If you do not wish your phone number to be viewed at the other end you can block it by dialing \*67, wait for the recording telling you your number is blocked and then dial her phone number.

The Calgary Pro-Choice Coalition needs your help to fight the Committee to End Tax-Funded Abortions (very well promoted in the Alberta Report). They have mounted a strong campaign to de-insure abortion services, as well as a campaign against Klein's support of tax-funded abortion services. Please write to Provincial Health Minister, Shirley McLellan (c.c. Ralph Klein) at 127 Legislature Building, Edmonton, T5K 2B6 or fax: 429-5954 in support of women's rights to safe, tax-funded abortion services in hospitals and clinics. Contrary to the federal government's own Foreign Policy Review recommendations, Foreign Affairs Minister Andre Ouellet decided to cut all funding to community-based education agencies including the Arusha Centre (Calgary) and the Centre for International Alternatives (Edmonton - formerly the Learners Centre). This was done in an atmosphere of secrecy. On March 24th, a single week before the funding year ended, the Centres were notified there would be no further funding. We are asking the Minister to change his decision - not to restore full funding, but to put education groups like Arusha on the same footing as non government organizations

which support projects overseas, with a 1 to 1 funding match to local dollars. 

#### By-Election Results Prove Opposition to Cuts Growing

Even though the Tories are claiming a big victory in the Calgary McCall by-election, the numbers demonstrate a different story. P.C. Shiraz Shariff became an MLA with 43% of the vote. However, the Liberals racked up over 34% of the vote, and former ASWAC staff member Anne McGrath received over 12% of the votes running for the New Democrats.

Tally it up and it is clear that more people voted against the Klein agenda than supported it. Cuts to health care and education seemed to be the major issues during the by-election. The "Tory Machine" was in high gear for this election because a big win could be used to prove Albertans are still supporting the cutbacks. The desired landslide P.C. win didn't happen, proving instead that opposition to the cuts is growing.

As is typical with by-elections, the voter turn-out was very poor, about 30%. The Social Credit Party received 8% and the Confederation of Regions Party received 1% of the votes.
