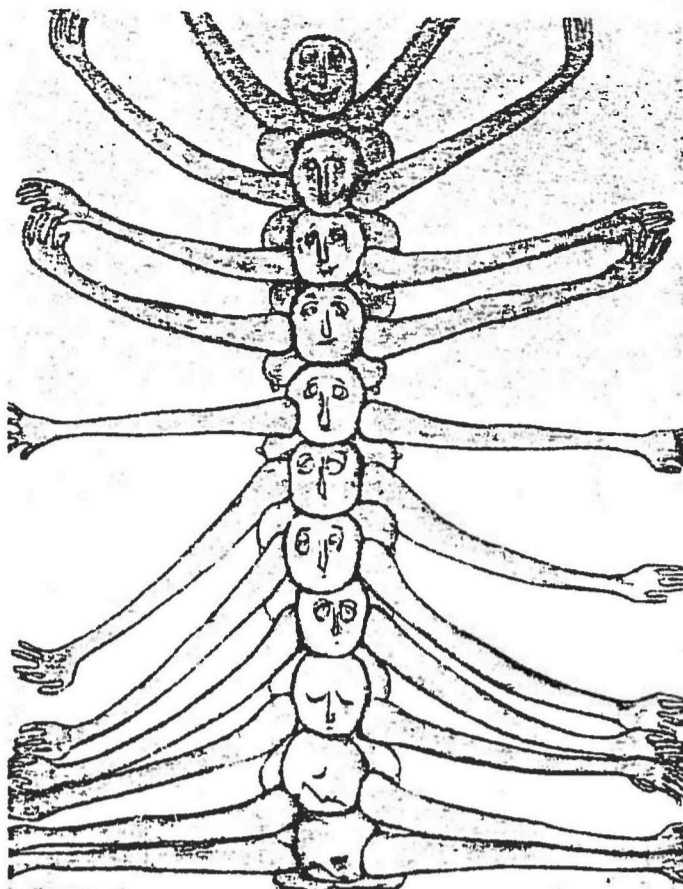

MEDIA WATCH

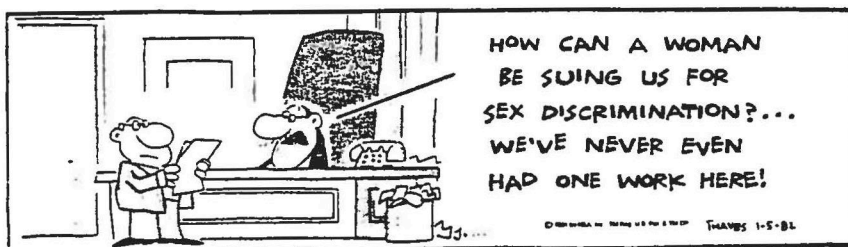
MEDIA WATCH has now distributed over 2,000 forms. Due to limited funds, we have been unable to fill large orders (some people are requesting 1000 forms). Groups who have the forms include women's centres at Sheridan College, U.B.C., York University, University of Regina, Okanagan College, Fanshawe College and Camosun College (Victoria), and forms were distributed at conferences held by NAWL, CRIAW, B.C. Federation of Women, Federated Anti-Poverty Groups, Status of Women Action Group (Victoria) and the NAC Mid-Year meeting. Unions and political parties have also distributed the form, and MEDIA WATCH has been written up in Kinesis, B.C. Human Rights Commission Newsletter, and an NDP National Newsletter.

We are encouraging women across the country to start their own MEDIA WATCH groups. The Media Monitoring Committee of the Manitoba Action Committee on the Status of Women has expressed interest. WE WOULD APPRECIATE EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST FROM OTHER NAC MEMBER GROUPS.

Complaints are coming in, though we expect increased postage costs have slowed the response. We have corresponded with complainants and with advertisers, broadcasters and the CRTC and CAAB. A brief was presented to the CHRC and interventions were made at CRTC hearings on Pay-TV and on Religious broadcasting. Copies of all these briefs can be made available. We are planning interventions, as and when appropriate, into CRTC license renewal hearings for broadcasting stations across the country. WE WILL BE ENCOURAGING NAC MEMBER GROUPS AND MEDIA WATCH "MONITORS" TO PARTICIPATE IN THESE, when stations in their local areas come up for licence renewal.

TODATE, we feel the response to our programme has been excellent. However, it is evident that there is a need for greater education and explanation; this has been particularly true when a MEDIA WATCH member has spoken about our programme after material showing the relationship between violence against women (e.g. the film NOT A LOVE STORY) has been shown.

In two years, the CRTC will decide whether the "self-regulation" now being implemented for advertisers and programmers has been effective. In order to properly document and assess the effectiveness of this self-regulation, we feel there is a great need for our members to attend conferences and consult with women's groups in order to fully explain the MEDIA WATCH programme. This will require money as we are requesting funds from the Secretary of State, Women's Programme, B.C. Human Rights Commission and other funding bodies. WE HAVE RECEIVED SMALL DONATIONS FROM GROUPS, AND MORE ARE VERY WELCOME.



Justice Committee

The Committee has sent a telegram and encourages all NAC Executive and Member groups to continue lobbying the federal government for the appointment of a woman to the vacancy on the Supreme Court.

Mary-Anne Nixon will present a brief on Sexual Assault to Federal Justice Affairs in Ottawa on March 8.

If possible, submissions should be typed on 28 cm by 22 cm paper with margins of 3 cm by 2 cm.

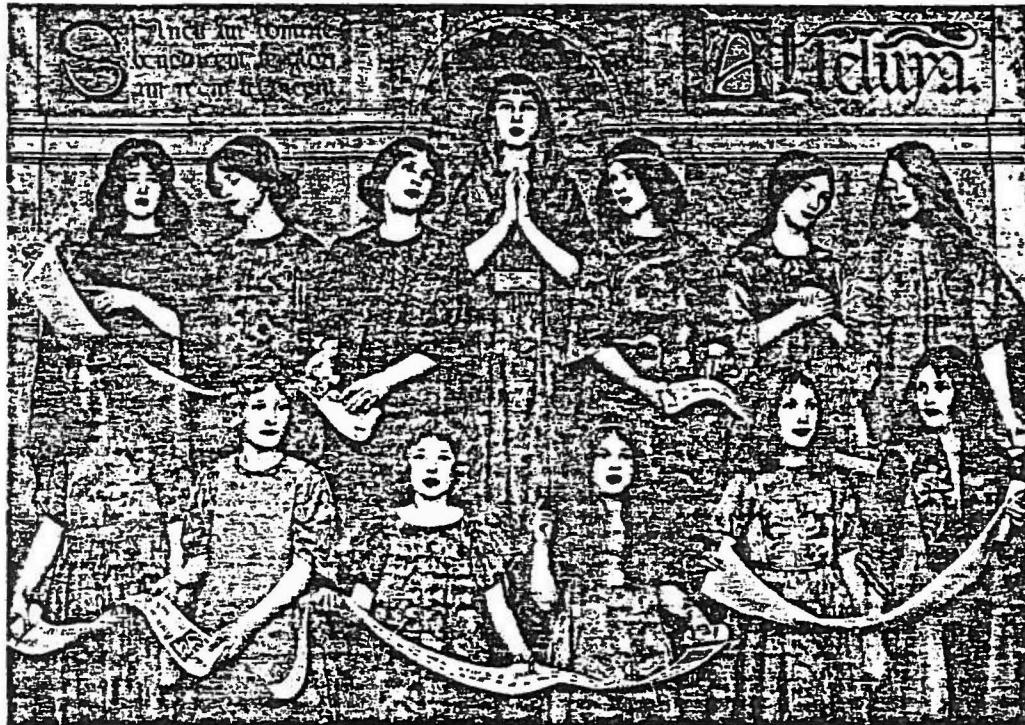

Pensions Committee

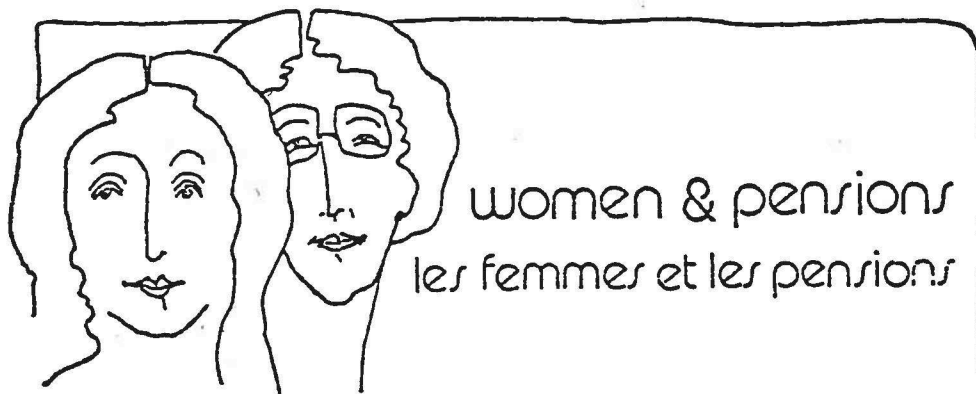
The Manitoba pension conference held on January 23rd was a great success.... Despite -38° temperatures, there were over 100 people in attendance.

We have heard that the government green paper on pensions has been delayed again. Now due in May 1982.

Donations will keep centres open

VANCOUVER (CP) — Rape relief centres in Vancouver, Victoria, Nanaimo and Terrace will be able to remain open without government money, according to a spokesman for the Coalition of B.C. Rape Crisis Centres.

Bonnie Agnew of Vancouver's Rape Relief said donations have been flooding in since last week's breakdown of talks between the provincial Government and the centres, and the Government's subsequent invitation to finance other groups willing to provide services to rape and sexual assault victims.

Miss Agnew said these private donations, along with donations from speaking engagements by rape relief volunteers will help cover operating expenses, which include rent and telephone bills.

"NOT A LOVE STORY"

This NFB film on pornography has been publicised throughout Canada. It has been banned in some provinces from general circulation but is available for hire by private parties from the National Film Board.

In Newfoundland, the Newfoundland Status of Women Council, St. John's, has shown the film several times and conducted discussion on it with a resource person, together with a donation box. They have collected \$1100 in this way for transition houses.

Your group may want to follow up on this and combine viewing and discussion on a very important subject with fundraising for women's shelters.

PRAISING GOD TOGETHER

At previous NAC Annual Meetings, some women have gathered on Sunday morning to express their sisterhood in religious belief. The interfaith service this year will be prepared collectively by all women who would like to assist. Please bring to Ottawa relevant material you wish to share and watch for posters announcing time and place.

REPRODUCTIVE FREEDOM

As we go to press, Joe Borowski is still waiting to hear where his challenge to Canada's abortion law will be heard - Federal or Provincial. But when that decision is made by the Supreme Court of Canada, Borowski and his lawyer say they are ready to go.

In the December MEMO we told you about the Supreme Court's decision to grant Borowski standing to challenge the Federal Legislation, on the grounds that it violates the Canadian Bill of Rights. Borowski says fetuses and embryos are persons and he wants to see abortions totally outlawed.

This very serious challenge to women's right to safe legal abortion must be answered. Already, CARAL has engaged legal counsel to try to intervene in the case. The Canadian Government must defend its current legislation, which allows abortion under certain circumstances.

A letter from you to the Hon. Jean Chretien, Minister of Justice, would help him to understand what the majority of Canadians support -----

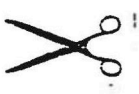
