The Newsletter Committee

Dear Womonspace:

I write for two reasons. The first is to thank the organizers of Gala. The events provided a fine balance of the things we all need: affirmation, celebration, and provocation.

The second is to comment on Chris Bearchell's position in the panel "Gay Perspectives on Pornography." Chris was neatly rebutted by Coreen Douglas and Mair Smith (the other panelists). Each exposed aspects of the issues of pornography and prostitution that Chris seems to ignore, like the fact that organized crime controls the production and distribuiton of pornography and that the sale of pornographic material earns in the billions of dollars each year, or that pornography is produced almost exclusively by men for men using women. Mair's definition of pornography seemed especially useful. As I recall, she said pornography uses images of unequal power to provide sexual arousal. As Coreen pointed out, those images reflect the real power imbalance between men and women. As you see, Chris's pro-pornography position met substantial criticism.

However, some of the underlying assumptions and assertions in Chris's presentation do, I think, need more examination. I object most strenuously to Chris's view that "sex industry workers" (i.e. prostitutes and/or those who appear in pornographic photos or flics) are simply providing a service, a necessary personal service, like workers in health care. This view is wrong: not because the working conditions are different, and not because society sees the one as respectable and the other as shameful, but because this view supports the tired old lie that men must have a sex outlet and that women



are on earth to provide it. That our culture maintains a sub-group of individual women for this purpose ("throwaway women", Kathleen Barry calls them) suggests that Chris's view is shared by the established power structure she pretends to challenge. Will legalization change that assumption? Hardly.*

As well, many women in the audience objected to Chris's contention that "sex industry workers" <u>chose</u> that life, freely and thoughtfully. The logic (why would anyone choose a despised, violent life?) and the evidence (the majority of prostitutes were sexually abused as children) work against the image of free choice that Chris constructed.

Few of us reacted to the continual imputation that to be antipornography is to be "squeamish", that only prudes feel that an alliance of sex and love (or affection, respect, mutual pleasure, comfort) is important and that the moral majority and feminist anti-pornography types share a fear and loathing of sex. It is far more accurate to say that the moral majority fundamentalist and the pornographer have a common value and a common qoal. Both believe that women must conform to men's wishes and needs; both have a horror of independent women.

Chris has missed the point: independent women have a pride and pleasure in their bodies that excludes any exploitation and any external control.

So why would they be so co-operative in offering Steppin' Out for Womanspace dances? They know they can fill the club on those evenings and business definitely needs a boost. Those of us who frequent Steppin' Out know that at least half if not more of the patrons are women. For us to boycott it would give the owners a clearer picture of our contribution to keeping their doors open. They're in business to make money - but this attitude makes it very difficult to give them any of mine.

I urge the Womonspace executive to reconsider using the facilities of this club for dances this summer. I will personally be enlisting the support of women whose initials appear below not to attend these functions.

THOUGHTS ON WOMYNS SPIRITUALITY ...

I was fortunate enough within the last few weeks to watch one of my favourite non-human friends ('Scrapper') give birth to five lovely little kittens. Watching her not only give birth, but take care of her offspring has been a very enlightening experience. It has also spurred me into thinking more about the patriarchal definition of the ''maternal instinct'' and about the spiritual and healing power womyn possess.

The nurturing, protective warm feelings incorrectly labeled as the "maternal instinct" is merely the tip of the spiritual iceberg; and I suspect at the core of every womyn is a vast keg of spirituality we are only now relearning to tap in spite of the many centuries of degredation, denial and death. An average dictionaly would define spirituality as 1) of the spirit or soul; or 2) of or consisting of spirit; not corporeal (of or for the body). I would further venture to guess that spirituality to the average non-feminist or non-pro womyn person would mean religion and/or God in the patriarchal and Christian sense of the word; ask them about womyns spirituality and they may conjure up images of wild witches burned alive as manifestations of the DEVIL many centuries ago in Salem. However, there is of late a new resurgence of the energy and power of female spirituality. In my search for words to describe this force | found an article titled "The Politics of Feminist Spirituality" by Anna Kent Rush (in The Politics of Women's Spirituality, ed. by Charlene Spretnak) which gave me a temporary satisfactory description... "the renaissance of female spirituality...of the ultimate holiness or life-sacredness of



women and the female creative process." Rush goes on to describe witches as "women who dare to worship their own power". Well over 300,000 of these incredibly powerful womyn were burned alive, not because they were part of the so-called DEVIL. but rather because they dared to be strong, self-loving womyn who resisted the patriarchal definitions of womyn and thereby defied the patriarchal God and establishment. And as Rush so clearly emphasizes, "with so many centuries of brutal religious persecution, [it stands to reason] that women today should have a deep fear of ... our own spirituality."

Part of developing or uncovering our spiritualness lies, I believe, in re-connecting; too much of our day to day lives are segregated and separated. Womyn have been separated from each other for thousands of years; our 'paid' work is separate from our unpaid 'fun' work; our physiological and internal cycles are separate from our external cycles; at times, our emotional beliefs and needs are isolated from our practicle needs: the personal is deemed separate or different from the political; even the way children learn in school is separated--they study math for one hour over here and then they leave it completely and study history for another hour over there. And most definitely our daily and monthly rhythms as womyn are separated from the earth's and moon's cycles. The most dangerous result of this isolation and compartmentalizing of our lives is numbness. We learn as womyn to shut emotions and needs off and put them away on a little shelf somewhere. In effect, we learn not to feel; we learn to use denial (i.e. the very real

threat of annihation by the superpowers that most people ignore) and we learn to feel only very safe emotions (i.e. fear or sadness only at the movies)...

This is why discovering our spirituality (or re-connecting) can be such a powerful healing force; and this is also why feminism cannot succeed without the crucial development of the spiritual in each one of us. Womyns experience is the antecedent of feminist theory; it is the re-connecting of the human with nature; and most definitely the re-connecting of the female with the female. And as Rush again emphasizes "...it is a collective, non-hierarchical. nonsegmented, experience-based. ecological, evolutionary process". Feminism can initially be quite painful--seeing and feeling the non-sensical institutionalized violence against womyn and against our environment is a very difficult process to endure. Very few of us have escaped the manifestations of this violence in our own lives either as children or as adult womyn. Decompartmentalizing our lives can be painful as well, but re-connecting with other womyn, and with the 'natural' cannot help but be healing as well. Womyn have the innate ability to be warm, compassionate, nurturing and affectionate towards each other and this is what heals the pain created by the violence of men.

Six months ago, I never would have even read an article like this; today I not only believe it but I try to actualize it wherever possible. And that is because of the healing (and spiritual) process of bringing my life together with other womyn. "Witches Heal!" They really do-and there is one in each one of us.


Womonspace is its members. You are Womonspace. Your participation directs what happens in the group.



FIRST ANNUAL CAMPOUT, MINNOW LAKE



No city hall recognition for gay awareness day

Edmonton's gay community will likely stage its week-long awareness festivities again this year without official recognition from city hall.

The mayor's office has already told the organizing committee of Gay and Lesbian Awareness (GALA) '84 that it is not an event attracting broad public appeal, and therefore Mayor Laurence Decore would not be declaring June 27 gay and lesbian awareness day.

Some alderman are skittish, if not downright against it.

"I would never in one minute endorse such a thing," Ald. Julian Kinisky said Thursday. "Personally, I have no sympathy whatsoever for their cause.

"I don't understand gays and I don't want to understand them," he said.

"No way," echoed Ald. Lyall Roper. "It would serve no purpose. It's not our function."

But Liz, an organizing member of GALA, said the group is prepared to attract public attention to its cause if council turns down its request.

"We are prepared to make an issue, especially if other groups can just call up the city on the telephone to ask for a special day in recognition of something like diabetes and can get a warm welcome," she said. Although the city has no written policy on declaring special days or weeks, Jim Ross, a spokesman for the city's Corporate Communications Department, said judgments are based on general community support for events such as Daffodil Day.

"We try to keep these to a minimum of four or five a year," he said.

Ald. Ed Ewasiuk said he will raise GALA's request at the June 19 council meeting, suggesting the matter be officially referred to the mayor's office or to council's public affairs committee for consideration.

Ald. Lillian Staroszik, a member of the public affairs committee, said she would

support a referral and would be glad to hear a presentation from GALA organizers.

"Under the human rights provisions there shouldn't be any discrimination under sexual orientation," Ewasiuk explained. "I personally wouldn't have any objection if the mayor declared an official day."

Ewasiuk, however, expected a declaration would get mixed public reaction.

The above article appeared in the early edition of the Edmonton Journal, June 8, 1984.

We hope you agree that the statements made by Alderman Julian Kinisky are appalling. We feel it is important that elected officials be taken to task when they blatantly put down a minority group. In this case, if Kinisky's remarks are allowed to go unchallenged, lesbians and gay men are belittled and their concerns are trivialized. Kinisky promotes and legitimizes intolerance and discrimination by such remarks.

Please take the time to do one or more of the following:

1. Write to the Mayor and Council expressing some form of disfavour (or abhorrence, alarm, disgust, etc.) with Alderman Kinisky's comments. Include some of the above arguments and/or some of your own. Keep your letter brief, three or four paragraphs at most. Omit any "Dear ..." in the letter and address the envelope and letter as shown below. When this format is used, the City Clerk automatically sends copies to the Aldermen and the letter is recorded in City Council minutes.

2. Write a similar letter to the editor of the Edmonton Journal or the Edmonton Sun. Sign your name and include your address and phone number as otherwise your letter will probably not be published.
