

IF ONE IS CHEATED, WE ALL SUFFER!

"No woman can call herself free until she can choose consciously whether she will or will not be a mother." Margaret Sanger, 1920

This is perhaps one of the most challenging editorials I will have ever written for WOMONSPACE NEWS; it is also going to be my last. After this issue, I will no longer be working as editor of this newsletter. I feel my reasons were expressed quite adequately in the June editorial, but I would like to expand on them again here. Also, I feel a need to look at the recent rejection of Planned Parenthood's application for membership in the United Way in an attempt to further explain why I am leaving Womonspace.

Planned Parenthood is an organization in Edmonton which provides information upon request about abortion, about avoiding unwanted pregnancies and venereal disease. and about birth control. It applied to become a member of the United Way to help fund a \$13,000 education program. Even though Planned Parenthood met United Way membership criteria, their application was rejected due solely to the threat that Catholic organizations and the Catholic community in general (who oppose birth control and abortion) may possibly withhold funds and support from the United Way if Planned Parenthood was accepted.

At first glance, it might seem that this issue has absolutely nothing to do with lesbians. For obvious reasons birth control and abortion seem like issues that do not touch our lives and are immediate concerns for non-lesbian womyn only.

But if we take this issue one step farther, we can see that they are concerns that do affect us and are not so far removed from our own day to day struggle.

But first, let's consider why lesbianism is so frowned upon in society. All the reasons in their complete depth are out of the range of one editorial, but we can still briefly look at a couple of them. One of the main instigators of our oppression is the church. Most organized religions still maintain we have been condemned in the eyes of "god" more so than all other "sinners" in the world, and we will suffer a worse punishment (worse than non-lesbian sinners) if we don't "repemt" and change our evil ways. It is this very same church that has condemned abortion and birth control, thereby eliminating for womyn the right to choose to be a mother or to be childless, to be sexually active or celibate, and given the discrepancies in the labour force between men and womyn, to be economically dependent or independent. In both cases, our right to choose our own lifestyle has been taken away by a male-dominated, and malebenefitting institution. If any womyn in our society cannot freely choose to use birth control or choose to have a safe abortion, than she certainly will not be able to choose another womyn as her sexual, emotional and spiritual partner either.

One of the other main institutions which oppresses lesbians is the institution of heterosexuality and heterosexism. Our society (created by men for men) is founded on the nuclear family; attitudes and structures within that "family ideology" mirror those within the larger society as a whole. 'Women' are supposed to get married, take their husbands' name, bear and raise his children, and meet all of

his sexual and physical needs without expecting the same in return.

'Woman' is not to have any other role nor should she desire to have any other role. Lesbians are womyn who step away from that ideology and live a lifestyle which is almost in total opposition to the ideal nuclear family. In order to keep womyn from straying from men, lesbianism is degraded and shunned, and as a result is eliminated as a viable and legitimate alternative or choice. Womyn who are sexually active and who consciously choose not to be mothers (either through birth control or abortion) are also stepping outside of what is considered womyn's only occupation. In my opinion, that is why safe, effective birth control and abortions are the issues that they are. (Betty Freidan, author of The Feminine Mystique and The Second Stage, has some interesting ideas about abortion. She says being for abortion is like being for tonsillectomies - it is just a medical procedure. The real issue is womyn's right to choose and to have control of her own body and life.) Nonlesbian womyn are fighting for the right to be independent and selfdetermining. And is that not the same thing lesbian womyn are demanding? To freely decide how we want to live our lives as womyn and to be unharrassed while doing it?!

So the United Way's rejection of Planned Parenthood is not as isolated an issue as it first may appear to be. It is an assault on all womyn, not just those who need birth control or abortion. At least in my opinion it is - some lesbians may not agree with me and may not feel it is a relevant issue for them. And this brings me back to the reasons I am leaving WOMONSPACE.

My involvement with this newsletter has been very valuable for me. It has helped me to better understand



and priorize my committments; I am a womyn and a feminist first, a lesbian second, and I truly believe that when the violence against us as womyn ends, so will the violence against us as lesbians. I feel it is impossible to actively separate struggles into lesbian and nonlesbian. We are all fighting the same problem that only manifests itself differently in different womyn's lives. And I cannot isolate myself and my energies solely within any one of those struggles. As I said earlier, my experience within Womonspace has been very valuable and useful for me, but I feel it is time to move on. Thank to those of you who've given me support! Good luck!!

Dear Jean,

We feel a need to take issue with your editorial in the June 84 issue of WOMONSPACE NEWS.

We protest your suggestions that we refuse to recognize the politicalness of our actions, that we are right wing, non-lesbian feminist, that we are not connecting the effects of issues such as pornography with our lives as lesbians and that we as a group, do not consider the political impact of organizing as a lesbian group.

There are many possible reasons for taking such a stance as an editor: an effort to provoke a response to the issue; simple lack of information regarding the activities of our group; a difference in the use of the term "political". We are not sure which of these was your motivating factor; it may have been something totally unrelated, or all of these factors.

As an organization we are a little over two years old. The effect of this is that we are still in the process of establishing ourselves as a group, or sorting out our priorities and seeing what needs we can most effectively meet. We hope that this process will never end and that our focus can shift and change with the needs of the organization. Otherwise we will die.

Womonspace was formed to meet the social and recreational needs of lesbians in Edmonton. To create a space for the lesbians in this area to meet for social contact and to feel a sense of belongingness to a community. This is an essential and basic need for all human beings, and as we in our community know only too well, one of the hardest for us to fill. Many of us have experienced the horror of being isolated as a lesbian.

It seems that we meet this need well. Potentially, at least 2500 of us could attend our dances in a year. We know that roughly a third of the womon at the dances are not "regulars" - they come only occasionly to have a social contact and that seems to be all that those 850 or so people seem to need from us.

A serendipitious by-product of the dances is that Womonspace is financially in reasonable condition. This is unusual for any volunteer group; for a lesbian group it is indeed rare. Given womon's incomes and our poor economy in Alberta, we have done something right for sure.

If we assume that the article comes at least in part from lack of information, it would be useful to list some of the activities we have held in the past that we consider lesbian/feminist political:
*held a benefit to help establish Every Woman's Place
*film - 'Killing Us Softly' (sexism in advertising)
*workshops - Lesbian sexuality
- Contracting/Legal issues

in Lesbian relationships *radio interviews *newspaper interviews *membership on G.A.L.A. Steering Committee *participation in G.A.L.A. events *International Women's Day marched, carrying our banner *I.W.D. - workshop in foyer of Edmonton Public Library on lesbianism feminism that ended by our joining hands and singing *monthly lesbianism/feminism discussion group at which any issue may be discussed if the group agrees *production of a lesbian newsletter *production and distribution of a

brochure throughout the Edmonton community and beyond

No, we do not have a group or committee labelled "political action" or some such title. You can see that we do put energy into many issues that touch our lives as lesbians and as womon. Nor, to our knowledge, has anyone ever been stopped from expressing this sort of a need and from finding other womon who are also interested, and in acting to channel some of Womonspace's energy in this area.

A basic issue here seems to be the need for traditional labels to be applied, and for our activities to take the form of those traditionally labelled as political. If one accepts that premise, then one can accept your stance that Womonspace is indeed not political. We do not feel the need for denying the political impact of these actions simply because they were not given the label of political from the outset.

Should there be womon who feel the need for the label, and for the traditionally political, or who would like our energies to be put into different areas, then they are encouraged to approach the membership in an effort to create such a focus for Womonspace. Surely there is space for all of us in Womonspace.

If you were simply trying to create a reaction, you were very effective, but perhaps not fully aware of the ongoing activities of our organization.

Dear Editor,

While realizing that the frustrations you are experiencing as an active member in the Womonspace organization may be partially justified, the appropriateness and fairness of some of your statements within the June editorial is rather questionable. Given that I personally do not feel that I can participate in Womonspace due to my own principles, I can empathize with how you feel. There is, however, a fine line between constructive and destructive criticism.

Granted you did recognize the building efforts of the womyn who have laboured so that the organization could achieve its current state and rightly praise them for their efforts. You additionally note the need for Womonspace - to realize that feminism must have its rightful expression as a basic principle in a lesbian organization. It is from this last point on in your editorial, however, that I found highly objectionable.

Feminism and lesbianism are, contrary to your statements, quite separable. One can be a lesbian and not a feminist. Furthermore, even the lesbian who is a feminist, as is the case with myself, can and does maintain both as separate parts of their own identity. Lesbianism is the expression of one's lifestyle and sexual preference, whereas feminism is one's ideological beliefs. Womonspace, as with all lesbian organizations, should provide the opportunities for expressing the former in a supportive environment. Ideally, it should also provide

activities which are directed toward the latter for those womyn who wish to participate. First and foremost, however, it is a lesbian organization which must see that this need is filled first as this is the primary bond which draws such a diversity of womyn together.

To view Womonspace as a rightwing organization is completely unjust to the womyn who have worked so hard to build and maintain it. Groups such as the Klu Klux Klan, Renaissance Canada (the traditional pro-family organization which funded Anita Bryant's trips to Canada). and many other fundamentalist groups are right-wing. Placing Womonspace in the same category as these groups is slanderous and false. As you recognized the differences among the womyn in the community, why do you fail to tolerate and understand the perspectives of the active womyn in the organization and mislabel what you disagree with?

I personally felt additional slants against educated "middle class" womyn in your editorial. This is yet another difference that should be recognized as an aspect of the lesbian community. Even though I cannot claim the "middle-class" status, I would rightly defend myself and other womyn who choose to pursue and achieve academic endeavors just as I would defend other womyn's choices to take non-academic routes. (Which is probably a more practical alternative given today's economy.)

That you're leaving the newsletter because of the "unresolveable" differences in your ideology and Womonspace's will be a terrible loss to all of the womyn in this community. Since you've been the editor, you have provided the beginnings of the foundations for feminist perspective to operate within the organization. In fact, I would think that as the number and quality of feminist



articles and editorials has substantially increased since you've been contributing, this would be an indication that you can operate and provide opportunities for the expression of these ideas within Womonspace.

Two of the pieces in the same edition as your editorial seem particularly relevant here. The letter to you from Jude praising your work and Womonspace should indicate how much you are appreciated. (I must, however, differ with her opinion that infighting is minimal in Womonspace.) The excellent article by Laura Lee titled "How We Deal With Our Differences" should also demonstrate how much Womonspace needs the expression of individual and group differences to make it a vital and growing group.

Even though I cannot agree with every point you wnote, I do recognize that womyn such as yourself are very much needed in Womonspace and can see that your quitting will only weaken the possibility of one aspect of feminism being expressed.


We have compiled and distributed a brochure describing Womonspace. We are working with the Newsletter Committee to formulate Newsletter policy.








WHY METAMORPHOSIS?

HORSE-BACK RIDING IN WHITE COTTON PANTS??
GIVE ME A BREAK!

I don't know how most of you feel but I think I've had just about enough! It's that time of the month, no not newsletter time, but that other time, when you don't leave the couch or your hot water bottle for at least four days of every month. And so what does one do when one is laid up on the couch suffering from PMS (Pre-Menstrual Syndrome)? One watches the good ole 'black and white fireplace' (the T.V.) right? Now...it never fails that as I'm sitting (painfully sitting) on the couch, wrapped up in as many blankets as I can find, feeling as though I've gained about 400 pounds of water, clutching a hot water bottle to my what should come on abdomen, T.V. but one of those ridiculous commercials for 'feminine products' that offer supposed comfort and security. We are led to believe

that by using those products, the womyn in the commercials can go horse-back riding (in their best white cotton pants) or play tennis (in white again) or do gymnastics or some other form of idiotic activity that I never even attempt on my very best days! Swimming? Well perhaps - after all, when I'm not greiving on the couch I'm usually soaking in a hot bath. Walking? Okay, realistically speaking, we all have to go to work, PMS or no PMS, so fine, I walk to the bus stop. BUT HORSE-BACK RIDING IN WHITE COTTON PANTS? Come on now! Let's be honest about this. "The camera closes in on a womyn sleeping restlessly. It's 3:00 am. Suddenly her eyes open. "Oh shit" she exclaims as she throws the covers off and dashes to the washroom. She emerges from the washroom a few minutes later wearing different pyjama bottoms. She returns to her bedroom, pulls the sheets off and throws them in the laundry hamper. Her roomates peer around the corner of her room and harmlessly enquire "What's up?" She turns and moans that they better just mind their own business and quit picking on her. Stained blue jeans, ruined underwear, a bulging stomach and long afternoons moaning on the couch are the only reality I've ever known.) So please, don't be fooled and please, please, please, whatever you do, don't but on your best white pants and go horse-back riding! It is not a pleasant experience!!!

STAYING OUT OF STEPPIN' OUT

Here are some of the reasons why I won't go to Steppin' Out:

- a) The first time I was there, I was amazed to be charged different prices each of the 3 times that I ordered the same drink.
- b) The second time, I was very sick after eating there, as was my partner.
- c) I ordered dinner and coffee the third time and was refused refills on the coffee. My repeated requests for club soda were ignored.
- d) The next time, I ordered a cheeseburger. A man who came in 10 minutes after me was served a cheeseburger 5 minutes after he sat down. I waited 25 minutes and still no burger, so I cancelled my order. The waiter was then very rude to me. A woman I was with ordered Kalua and coffee and was charged for the Kalua plus \$2.50 for the coffee and \$2.00 for each coffee refill. was informed that the reason for this high price is because Steppin' Out doesn't want people sitting in the place drinking non-alchoholic beverages.)
- e) A woman who joined a party of seven (all of them were eating and drinking) and asked for water was told, "We don't serve water here. If you only want water you can order club soda or leave."

These are my direct experiences. I have also heard many grumblings about both the policies and the service at Steppin' Out.

Steppin' Out isn't the only bad one. Last year the owner of Boots & Saddle told an Edmonton Journal reporter that the reason dykes were not allowed in his club was because they got in fights. Women are now permitted to enter Boots if they are signed in, but why any gay woman would want to go there is beyond me.



Flashback held a special meeting in the fall to determine what exactly the women of Edmonton wanted. We asked for Friday nights to be restricted to women only. They told us then that it would be impossible, because they are a private club of mixed membership, to completely close the doors to one sex on a weekend. Three months later, Friday nights became menonly nights at Flashback.

I think it's sad that women continue to frequent these places where we are treated so poorly. But what is our alternative?

You might wonder why Womonspace will lend its name to dances at Steppin' Out when the vice-president is so adamantly against it. I want people to know I was not a party to that decision. A special board meeting was held to discuss it and I was given 45 minutes notice. A board member had said earlier that day, "We already have quorum, so we don't need Mary [for the board to vote]."

One of my understandings of Womonspace is that it was formed to provide an alternative to the club scene. Why is our name being lent to a profitable, private, male-owned business? The only benefit to Womonspace is a profit of \$2.00 per person. I feel the soul of Womonspace has been bought by private enterprise. The management of Steppin' Out is perfectly capable of providing women-only functions without the sponsorship of Womonspace.

In writing this, I'm hoping to appeal to your political consciousness to join me in boycotting Steppin' Out and the Womonspace dances there.

THE DANCE THAT DIED

The June Womonspace dance came to a rather pathetic end when the power was cut at 12:30 a.m. In spite of the many butane lighters, dance staff were unable to find a breaker panel on the main floor. More than one womon got a large drink as the bar staff valiantly continued to pour in the dark. And lively musical entertainment was provided by unidentified "singers".

A slight damper was put on the fun when dance staff came across a vandalized office and had to call the police to report a possible break-in. We did make an official report of the incident and discovered the next day, when we finally got in contact with the community league, that the break-in had already been reported.

The dance organizers want to say a big thank you to all the womyn for their patience and for making such a speedy exit.



LESBIAN TALK NIGHT

The last Thursday in May saw 15 of us meet for our monthly chats about lesbianism/feminism. This is a new event for Womonspace and we thought an appropriate way to start would be to discuss our own beginnings as lesbians - so we each had a chance to share "Our Own Coming Out Story".

We were 15 or so in number, and as we went around the circle, themes began to emerge - our feelings of isolation as we came out was a very strong theme - one after another, we talked of feeling alone, of not knowing where to look for others like ourselves, and of our determination to do so - even though we freely admitted we were scared of what we might or might not find! And of our relief to discover others like ourselves.

Another common theme was finding that many of those around us - parents, brothers/sisters, friends, husbands - were aware of our sexual preference long before we were; and that when we finally gathered every bit of our courage to come out to these people, they simply said - "we know" and we felt deflated, relieved and very surprised.

We talked about the support from other women we get along the way; and the support was very real in that room, as we listened, and sometimes held a nervous woman's hand as she talked; laughed a lot and learned a lot about ourselves and each other.

We left, reluctantly that evening, feeling stronger, with great awe and respect for our caring, determination and courage. (And for sure, we got a new meaning of the word "pipe-fitter" that we'll never forget.)

Thanks to Womonspace for making this possible.


General meetings are held on the second Tuesday of every month at E.W.P. at 7:30 pm. Next one is July 10.
