Dear Sisters,

The Women's Place staff will take a breather during the next few weeks. Due to preparations for the fall Liberation School, September has been our busiest month so far. Finding instructors and co-ordinators was the most difficult task. One course almost had to be cancelled at the last minute and another instructor was found on the day before registration.

Telephone calls and visitors poured into the office after an article about The Women's Place in the Toronto Star. We spent that week running between phones and added several hundred names to our mailing list.

Several television and radio stations contacted us about giving interviews, and we decided that we will only participate in interviews if the interviewers and photographers or technicians are women. We based that decision on the principle that women should be given every opportunity to earn money using their skills. Although none of the stations have women photographers on staff, we have a list of skilled women photographers who could be hired on a free-lance basis. Each of the male interviewers we spoke to made it very clear that he was not prepared to surrender his position to a mere woman, nor was anyone willing to hire a woman free-lancer.

We hope that our continued demands will put pressure on the stations and programs concerned to hire women technicians; in one case there appears to be some chance of success. More names of skilled women are needed. Any suggestions?

The lesbian drop-in held at the Women's Place every third Friday has been very successful. Come and bring your friends.

The circulation rate in our library has been good. Please come and visit or borrow. All books are loaned on a weekly basis. We also have a wide variety of books, articles, magazines and newspapers in the Lettuce Out bookstore. You can buy basic readings on the women's movement, fiction by female authors, or get into heavier political readings. We also have some excellent poetry. Posters are a big but inexpensive attraction and we have buttons, bumper stickers and other useful little stickers, and a record written and sung by a feminist.

A woman has installed a Gestetner offset press in the back porch of the Women's Place. She will have it in working order soon and needs both supplies and business.

Our Opportunities for Youth grant expired at the end of August and we are operating strictly on a volunteer basis. Now that vacations are over and people have settled down somewhat, perhaps you can give time to the Women's Place. We need volunteers who can come on a regular basis and who will be committed to staying here for a while. There is plenty of work for all. Please call and specify a time when you are free.

The Film Festival has been delayed again, and if you are beginning to think that it never really existed, please note the time and dates later in the newsletter. So far the films look really good, and we need the money badly, so please come. Which brings us neatly into the money question. We are finding it difficult to keep in operation under the present financial pressures we now bear. The Centre is now running strictly on donations and pledges. Money of any amount is welcome, or if you can afford to pledge a certain amount each month. you may send a series of postdated checks. Expenses for The Place include \$350 a month rent, \$50 a month utilities, \$200 a month newsletter, \$40 a month office supplies, \$20 a month telephone and \$50 a month for miscellaneous.

Some expenses such as the newsletter are too high. Therefore we must cut down our mailing list to those who are interested in getting it. If you wish to keep receiving the newsletter and have not responded in some way already, please call or send in the clipping at the end of this issue. Any of you who can afford to or would like to, please send stamps.

We have been asked many times by womenwho use the Centre how it is run and how control is exercised. As of the first week in September, there are 19 individual women eligible to participate in centre decisions. They are eligible because they have demonstrated their involvement in the women's movement, because they are dedicated and valuable to the centre and what it stands for.

In addition, every recognized work collective affiliated with the Women's Place has a right to representation.

Process of decision making is highly unstructured. Meetings of the Centre Collective are held periodically, usually on Thursdays; everyone eligible can come; agenda is open. While most of the time is normally spent in day to day routine business, this is where plans and policy for the Women's Place has to be determined.

Women's Place as such has no membership, so there is no formal way of "joining". Every woman is by definition a "member". Those who make the most contribution have the most say. Virtually any woman can become eligible to make Centre decisions. The group is fluid and is dedicated not to become a closed elite. As an example, there were 13 original founders, mine are still among the 19 currently in the Centre collective which is merely a formalization of the de facto situation.

So that's it. If you want to help run the Centre there is only one way to do it--help run the Centre! You will be welcome.

The Women's Bureau was established to conduct research for the improvement of the status of women employees, promote expansion of employment opportunities for women, receive and investigate complaints of acts contrary to the Equal Employment Opportunities Act. This Act prohibits/discrimination because of sex or marital status in hiring, training, promotion or dismissal. Discriminatory advertising or referral agencies is prohibited. All employers with more than 25 employees must provide 12 weeks maternity leave for women who have worked at least one year. Dismissal for pregnancy is prohibited. Anyone wishing to file a complaint should contact the Bureau.
