The Provinces

The Manitoba Action Committee with the help of Secretary of State funding, hired three students for a summer project called Outreach Manitoba. The main idea of this project was to travel to rural Manitoba to inform people about the Manitoba Action Committee on the Status of Women and its objectives.

The areas of interest ranged from equal pay for equal work to concerns about the rights for disabled women. One topic that came up constantly in the farming areas, was that of Mrs. Murdoch and the position of the woman on the farm. Women and men, who farmed both expressed indignation and surprise at the Supreme Court ruling.

The total number of women that we talked to and/or gave pamphlets to was approximately eight hundred. The corresponding number of men was three hundred and fifty. In general the response we got was good. People that we met were interested and concerned about the Status of Women.
