MAY 4 - NOT A LOVE STORY: A FILM ABOUT PORNOGRAPHY

You must be a paid up member of the Women's Centre to be admitted. About the film: Not A Love Story was produced by Studio D of the NFB's English Production branch. It is the chronicle of two women - Bonnie Sherr Klein, filmmaker and Linda Lee Tracey, stripper who together explore the world of peep shows, strip joints and sex supermarkets. Although their backgrounds are very different, both are motivated by a desire to know more about pornography - why it exists, what forms it takes and how it affects relations between men and women. The film combines frank interviews with people who earn their living in the "porn" trade - among them strippers, performers, a photographer and a magazine publisher - with scenes of them at work. Prominent Canadian and American feminists provide powerful insights into the effects of pornography on society and on the individual.

# SUDBURY RAPE CRISIS CENTRE

Rape and sexual assault have until recently been considered "taboo" subjects, not to be discussed in polite company. The underlying cause for this embarrassment was the perception that rape was a sexual offence, and furthermore, the victim was somehow to blame.

With the rise of the women's movement, such myths about rape are being dispelled. As women began to talk about the subject of rape, they increasingly saw the need to organize rape crisis centres to help other women. Rape Crisis Centres will of course respond immediately to a woman in crisis, by counselling her, accompanying her to the hospital, police station, and court. But Rape Crisis Centres are also vitally concerned with public education. Volunteers attempt to eradicate the myths associated with rape, and thereby to restore to women their sense of dignity and self-respect.

The Sudbury Rape Crisis Centre first opened in February of 1978.

It began as an offshoot of Telecare, which is a telephone distress

line. The counsellors at Telecare were receiving many calls from

victims of rape, and it became apparent to them that a telephone

service alone was not adequately meeting the special needs of the

callers.

Telecare still answers all rape crisis calls (675-1121), but these calls are turned over to trained Rape Crisis volunteers, who will contact the caller and provide any support possible. The Rape Crisis Centre also has an information library housed at the Sudbury Women's Centre at 38 Beech Street (673-1916). Volunteers have organized a Speakers Bureau and will try to meet all requests from the community for public speakers. Also, the Centre recently held a Public Forum entitled "Everything a Women Should Know About Sexual Assault (But Wished She Didn't Have To Ask"). Over 200

people attended this forum, demonstrating that the issue of rape and sexual assault is of vital interest to women.

If any women are interested in becoming involved with the Rape Crisis Centre, all are welcome to the monthly meetings, held at the Women's Centre, on the last Sunday of every month.

# Who Are The Women of La Leche League ?

It all started at a picnic, in Illinois. Conversation turned as it so often does to children and mothering. A great need was felt for support for and information about breast-feeding, an art not widely practiced in North America in that year of 1956. Big business had actually convinced us, that we were inadequate to meet the needs of our infants at the breast. The young women gathered that day decided otherwise and set about to show the world they were right. They have done it:

Twenty-five years later, La Leche League International (LLL) has trained leaders and certified groups in 42 countries. A LLL leader undergoes thorough training. She must first have nursed her own baby for at least one year. This insures personal experience with nursing children of many ages. She then embarks on a reading and study programme which covers various topics: child birth, child rearing, and breast-feeding. Her material is selected and approved by a professional advisory board of the world's most renowned pediatricians, obstetricians, allergists, nutritionists, psychologists etc. Her progress is supervised by other experienced LLL leaders. When a leader speaks on behalf of LLL, she does so with authority. She can be trusted with your questions and concerns.

Sudbury has two LLL groups. Their notice of meetings is included in this month's newsletter. The meetings are informal. Nursing babies and toddlers are usually in abundance. A first time mother would find it most helpful to come to meetings about three months before delivery. (I sure wish I had.) Breast-feeding is natural, and easy. There are very few women who actually cannot nurse. However we sometimes have unrealistic expectations or put artificial road-blocks in the path of our own success—The four hour schedule, supplemental bottle feedings? Sharing encouragement and practical solutions with women who have had proven success is invaluable. In our highly mobile, nuclear family society, we often have no one to turn to at this time in our lives when we are so needing of support, and so vulnerable to intimidation.

The meetings, held in a member's home, cover four general topics: 1) advantages of breast-feeding, 2) over-coming nursing difficulties, 3) child-birthing, 4) nutrition and weaning. Each group has a lending library, as well as books for sale on these topics. LLL has published its own book entitled The Womanly Art of Breast-feeding. It is the most extensive of the many books I have read on this subject. Also check out the especially well researched LLL re-prints which are of a more technical nature. Some of these are provided free of charge to a woman attending her first meeting. Membership is not compulsory for meeting attendance, but does go a long way in supporting the group to further its work. All staff is volunteer.

LLL is a single-minded organization. It does not espouse any other causes. You will find among its members, women of strongly divergent views on other issues. When they come together, however, they channel their energies towards their one purpose: the fostering of better mothering through breastfeeding. Their mandate goes far beyond the idea of food from the breast. The concept is much more holistic. We are looking at the nurturing of the child body and mind which starts in the relationship at the breast. In my own case, I found that LLL nurtured the mother, giving me support in the essentially human task of raising another sound human being. I should add here, for those of you who may have missed the experience of nursing a baby, that you will not find self-righteous judgment of the bottle-feeding mother.

If you plan to nurse your next baby, or would simply like to know more about this important community resource, catch the next La Leche League meeting. Meet the women who are helping women regain a feeling of competency in their body's ability. Meet the women who found an information vacuum and filled it expertly. Meet the women who have turned the trend in infant feeding around the world.
